Pot found

William Glen Mink, 42, of Cove Branch, was arrested Friday on felony charges for cultivating approximately two hundred marijuana plants on his property. Mink was also charged with unlawful transaction with a minor, when he allegedly used his minor child to assist in the cultivation.

According to court records, Mink, who had been in domestic violence court recently, on at least two occasions, was charged when his wife, Regina, gave consent to Sheriff's Deputy Roark to search the property. His search revealed a plot of nearly two hundred marijuana plants, paths leading to the plot, water buckets and other indications of cultivation, according to court records.

Mink has prior felony convictions in 1994 for cultivating marijuana and trafficking in marijuana.

Solid Waste Coordinator Don Coyle killed Sunday



Rockcastle County Solid Waste Coordinator Don Coyle, 68, of Brodhead, was killed in an accident on Hwy. 39 Sunday afternoon.

According to a Kentucky State Police, Coyle died after the bicycle he was riding was hit by a car driven by 17-year-old Derrick Todd of Eubank.

Police said that Coyle turned into the teenager's path causing the accident.

Pulaski County Deputy Coroner Kim Shumaker pronounced Coyle dead at the scene.

Police said the accident occurred at the junction of Ky. 935 and Hwy. 39 around 4 p.m. Sunday, near Woodstock School.

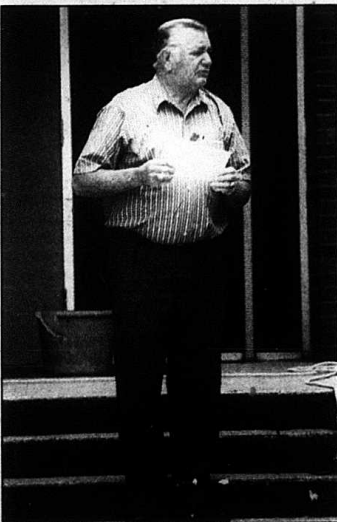
Coyle was also in charge of the federal Pride program which has pumped thousands of dollars into the county for clean-up of illegal dump sites.

"I really believe that Don was one of our leading citizens, he was extremely civic minded," said Rockcastle County Judge-Executive, Buzz Carlolius.

Ironically, Coyle taught a bike safety instruction class on Saturday to students at the Rockcastle Middle School as part of the 21st Century Learning Center.

Besides being head of PRIDE and Solid Waste Coordinator for the county, Coyle was also the current President of the Rockcastle Kiwanis Club, the county's most active civic group.

Two Mexicans die in shooting near Bee Lick

An undetermined number of shots were exchanged Sunday night near the Pulaski-Rockcastle line at Bee Lick in a feud among acquaintances, killing two Crab Orchard men and seriously wounding another.

The gun battle took place about 9:00 p.m. Sunday at the Eddie Reynolds property on Old Bee Lick Road near S&M Grocery, about 100 feet south of the Pulaski-Rockcastle line.

Pulaski County Sheriff Sam Catron said four or five men, including Jose de Jesus Estrada, 35, and Rene Arriano-Reynolds, 34, both of Crab Orchard, went to the home of Nicholas Gutierrez, 28, with whom they had a running feud.

Whatever they argued about at the Gutierrez home turned into violence and shots were fired.

Catron said that Estrada fired first at Gutierrez, whose Old Bee Lick Road address is Eubank, and the

Pulaski County resident returned fire. Both were treated at the scene by the Somerset-Pulaski County EMS and taken to Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital in Somerset. Estrada, who lived at 5990 Ky. Hwy. 1781, was pronounced dead on arrival.

Gutierrez was transferred by helicopter to the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington, where he was listed in serious condition.

The second man who died, Arriano-Reynolds, was pronounced dead at the scene from multiple gunshot wounds. Catron said it was unclear who fired the shots that killed Arriano-Reynolds, whose address was listed as 165 Edwards Road, Crab Orchard.

The Pulaski sheriff's department said the number and identity of any other persons present when the shootings occurred remains under investigation.

Police find meth lab in county

Friday Kentucky State Police reported that they received information of a possible lab in Rockcastle County used in the manufacturing of methamphetamine.

Troopers Lefe Owens and Tommy Cromer responded to the report at the

residence of Dwayne S. Blair on Old Chestnut Ridge approximately 3/4 mile south of Mt. Vernon.

After arriving troopers contacted the owner as to the reported information and was given consent to search by the owner. During the search troopers discovered a working methamphetamine lab along with the components used in the production of methamphetamine and marijuana at the residence, according to a news release.

Local banks accepting money for Red Cross

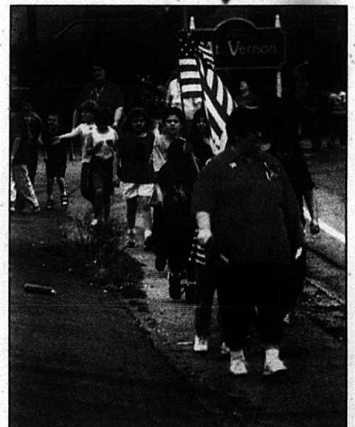

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spend effort transplanting it and before anybody knew what was going on it began blooming and the main stalk thickened to a plant that looked more like a tree. Maybe all these terrorists running around the country can snuff out a blooming tomato plant, but I can't do it and so announced to my family. By mid-August the plant was heavily laden with tomatoes that obviously were not cherries. Some of them were already soft-ball sized and growing.

And who knows. Like I said, I'm

saving seed from the flower bed tomato and if you want a few, just send me a self addressed, stamped envelope and I'll see that you get them. If they come up tommy-toes, (cherry tomatoes) please know that that's what I expected them to be this year.

In the meantime I'm having them for breakfast and supper every day and there's nothing money can buy that tastes this good. Not even true love.

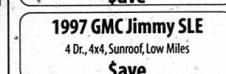

We have an excellent TRP program. I am very proud to be a part of it. We currently have thirty-seven clients taking part in the program. The program is divided into three units: clerical, housekeeping and kitchen.

Clerical takes care of most of the paperwork concerned with the clients (all that is not confidential anyway). Housekeeping does the cleaning for the group. They sweep and mop the dining area, run the sweeper and dust the social area, clean the bathrooms, etc. The kitchen unit does the cooking, helps plan the menu, mop the kitchen and clean the refrigerator, stove and pantries. The unit take turn doing the dishes. One week the kitchen unit does the lunch dishes, the next week it's clericals turn, then housekeeping does their work.

Our Daily Schedule is:

8:00-9:00 - Consumers arrive, sign in and socialize.

9:00-10:00 - Consumers arrive, sign in, socialize and have their a.m. snack.

10:00-10:30 - Community meeting, goal setting.

10:30-11:30 - unit meetings and work.

11:30-12:30 - Lunch

12:30-1:30 - Continuation of units and unit work - clean-up, dishes.

1:30-2:30 - Exercise, relaxation, sign language and social games.

Once a month we have what we call a social drop-in. During the social drop-in we do different things. Sometimes we do a movie, go bowling or shopping. In July we went to Dollywood. Last year we went to the state fair, the chicken festival and court days. The consumers decide which activities they participate in on the social drop-ins.

In addition to the gateway club we also have C.R.A.M.I. (Cumberland River Association for the Mentally III). The association is run by the consumers for the consumers, the consumers family and caregivers and other interested people. At the C.R.A.M.I. meetings we discuss current events, we read news, discuss issues such as the problems of alcoholism and other addictions, or the stigma attached to the mentally ill and how to alleviate it. We also socialize.

Since our consumers are also interested and involved in local and even statewide issues.

What follows is the full text of his trenchant remarks as printed in the Congressional Record:

"This Canadian thinks it is time to speak up for the Americans as the most generous and possibly the least appreciated people on all the earth. Germany, Japan and to a lesser extent, Britain and Italy were lifted out of the debris of war by the Americans who poured in billions of dollars and forgave other billions in debts. None of these countries is today paying even the interest on its remaining debts to the United States.

When France was in danger of collapsing in 1956, it was the Americans who propped it up, and their reward was to be insulted and swindled on the streets of Paris. I was there. I saw it.

When earthquakes hit distant cities, it is the United States that hurries in to help. This spring, 59 American communities were flatted by tornadoes. Nobody helped.

The Marshall Plan and the Truman Policy pumped billions of dollars into discouraged countries. Now newspapers in those countries are writing about the decadent, warmongering Americans.

I'd like to see just one of those countries that is gloating over the erosion of the United States dollar build its own airplane.

Does any other country in the world have a plane to equal the Boeing Jumbo Jet, the Lockheed Tri-Star, or the Douglas DC10? If so, why don't they fly them?

Why do all the International lines except Russia fly American planes? Why does no other land on earth even consider putting a man or woman on the moon? You talk about Japanese technocracy, and you get radios. You talk about German technocracy and you get automobiles. You talk about American technocracy, and you find men on the moon — not once, but several times — and safely home again.

Our neighbors have faced it alone and I'm one Canadian who is dazed tired of hearing them get kicked around. They will come out of this thing with their flag high. And when they do, they are entitled to thumb their nose at the lands that are gloating over their present troubles. I hope Canada is not one of those."

Be Cool-Chill Out! Refrigerate Promptly is this year's theme for NFSEM.

Harmful bacteria grow most rapidly in the Danger Zone - the unsafe temperatures between 40 and 140°F, so it's important to keep food out of

this temperature range. In addition, cold temperatures keep most harmful bacteria from growing; therefore, refrigerating food quickly is key!

Here are some helpful tips for keeping cold food cold:

- Make sure the temperature in the refrigerator is 40°F or below and 0°F or below in the freezer.
- Use a refrigerator/freezer thermometer to check the temperature. Don't overfill the refrigerator. Cool air must circulate to help keep food safe.
- Refrigerate or freeze perishables, prepared food, and leftovers within two hours of purchase or preparation,

Ordinance #5-2001

An Ordinance levying the annual ad valorem tax for city purposes in the corporate limits of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky.

Whereas, Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 92.230 requires that the legislative body of each city annually levy an ad valorem tax for city purposes, and,

Whereas, KRS 92.230 requires that all taxes be levied by ordinance, and,

Whereas, KRS 83A.130, 140 and 150 require that the legislative body, by ordinance provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government, and,

Whereas, the city has calculated the tax rate for real and personal property (hereinafter) in accordance with KRS chapter 132.

Now Therefore Be It Ordained, by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

Section One: Tax Levy - Real estate and personal property

A. An ad valorem tax rate of .169 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of real property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

B. An ad valorem tax rate of .169 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of personal property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

Section Two: Due Date, Payment, Discount and Penalty

All said taxes shall be due and payable at the City Offices on 30th day of November, 2001. Taxes paid prior to the due date shall receive a two per cent (2%) discount. Taxes paid up to thirty (30) days after the due date shall be at the face amount. Taxes paid more than thirty (30) days after the due date shall be charged a ten per cent (10%) penalty and interest at the rate of six per cent (6%) per annum calculated from the due date.

Section Three: Effective Date and Use Thereof

This ordinance applies to the 2001 calendar year assessment and all receipts shall be used for city purposes and accounted in the 2002 fiscal year and subsequent fiscal years in reference to delinquent collections.

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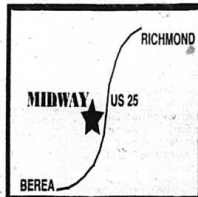
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Rockets play sloppy; win 55-0 over Estill

Streizel converted both kicks and the score was 21-0 at the end of the first period.

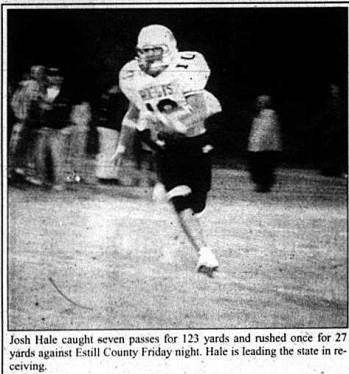
The rest of the Rocket scoring went as follows: Anderkin to sophomore Devin Taylor on a 32 yard pass.

In the first game of the championship match against Hazard, who are in their third year of the sport, the Lady Rockets played their worst game of the tournament and lost 15-7.

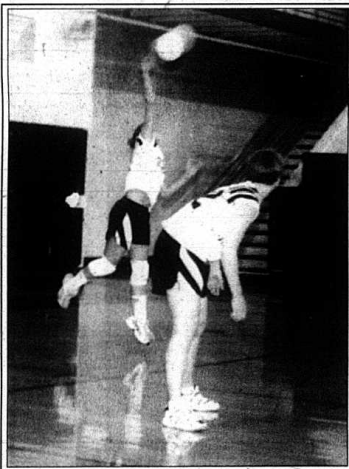

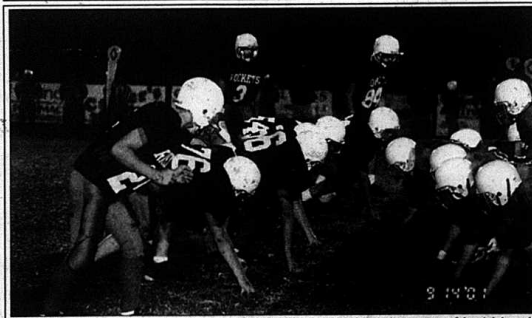

Mayfield and Wallace lead effort to aid Red Cross

Two Penske drivers and two NASCAR teams said they plan to make next week's Delaware 400 at the one-mile Dover Downs (Del.) International Raceway as positive a weekend as they can.

Jeremy Mayfield and the No. 12 Mobil 1 Taurus team, and Rusty Wallace and the No. 2 Miller Lite Taunus team will donate \$40 per lap completed of the Dover event to the Disaster Relief Fund of the American Red Cross, which is aiding victims and families of victims involved in Tuesday's terrorist attacks in New York City and Washington, D.C.

"We wanted to do this as soon as we could and, since New Hampshire was postponed, Dover is the next race. I'm putting up \$10 a lap and the Rusty Wallace team is putting up another \$10 per lap," Mayfield said. "Rusty is going to also put up \$10 a lap and his team is putting up another \$10 per lap. That would be up to \$16,000 between the two of us if we run as well as we are capable of running."

Wallace suggested this effort could grow considerably.

"What we want to do is encourage every driver and every team in the race at Dover to do the same thing," Wallace said. "We did a little math and, if we had done this in last year's race, there would have been over a quarter of a million dollars going to the American Red Cross."

Total laps completed in the September race at Dover last year were 13,470. At \$20 per lap, that would make \$269,400.

"We're awfully lucky to be living in this country and we're awfully lucky to have missed the disasters of Tuesday," Mayfield said. "This is a way for all of us in NASCAR Winston Cup racing to give a little something back."

"There is a lot that has been done and a lot still left to do, especially in Manhattan," Wallace said. "A lot of people have been hurt. I'm sure a lot of those people were race fans but, even if they weren't, we need to show we care and do something to help."

"Under the circumstances, this is the right thing to do. There were a lot of choices that could have been made but, in my opinion, this was the way to go. It's the right thing to do and it's the best thing to do."

When NASCAR announced the New Hampshire 300 had been rescheduled for Friday, Nov. 23, the day after Thanksgiving, most Winston Cup drivers fully supported the sanctioning body's decision.

John Andretti, driver of the No. 43 Fyfe Enterprises Dodge gave this reaction:

"Outside of my family, nothing on earth has meant as much to me as driving a race car, since I was a little kid. That's all I've ever done and all I've ever wanted to do. When someone like me is wondering whether I really want to race on a weekend or not, then a lot of people must be having some pretty serious doubts."

"Everybody is going to have to readjust and re-evaluate with the new date, and it's going to probably be pretty cold in New England when we go out. But the inconvenience we're facing is pretty slight compared to what so many people have undergone this week in our country."

Busch drivers Biffie and Sauter fined
NASCAR Busch series drivers Greg Biffie and Jay Sauter were hit where it hurt most as NASCAR announced penalties for both drivers last week as a result of on-track incidents during the Sept. 7 race at Richmond, VA.

Biffie and Sauter were each stripped of 100 driver points, while Sauter's team also lost 100 car-owner points. Biffie was fined \$15,000 and Sauter \$10,000. Both were placed on probation until Dec. 31. Sauter's crew chief was also fined \$5,000 and placed on probation until Dec. 31.

On Lap 185 of the 250-lap race at Richmond, Sauter turned into rookie Biffie's No. 60 Ford as they exited Turn 4, sending both into the wall. Biffie got out of his car, walked

over to Sauter's, and threw a punch into the driver's-side window.

The two had tangled earlier in the race, when Biffie hit Sauter from behind.

Although all of the penalties were issued for "actions deemed by NASCAR officials as detrimental to stock car racing," Biffie's penalty was issued expressly for fighting, while Sauter's was for "rough driving."

The loss of 100 points effectively puts Biffie out of the running for this year's Busch Series championship.

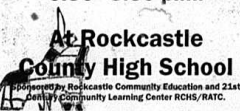

Talking with children about Terrorism

The terrorist attack on America has captured the attention of the nation, and it should. Children, however, have a hard time putting these emotionally charged events into perspective. They need the help of the adults around them.

So what is a parent, teacher, or other caring adult to do when terrorist violence fills the airwaves and the consciousness of America? Assume the kids know more about it than you think. The reality of today's world is that news travels far and wide. Adults and children learn about disasters and tragedies shortly after they occur, and live video footage with close-ups and interviews are part of the report. Not talking about it does not protect children. In fact, you may communicate that the subject is taboo and that you are unavailable if you remain silent.

Reassure young people and help them feel safe. When tragic events occur, children may be afraid that the same will happen to them. Try to be realistic as you reassure them, however. You can try to support them and protect them, but you can not keep all bad things from happening to children. You can say that, no matter what happens, your love will be with them. That is

realistic, and often that is all the children need to feel better.

* Be available and "askable." Let kids know that it is okay to talk about the unpleasant events. Listen to what they think and feel. By listening, you can find out if they have misunderstandings, and you can learn more about the support that they need.

* Share your feelings. Tell young people if you feel afraid, angry, or frustrated. It can help them to know that others also are upset by the events. Be careful not to overwhelm them or expect them to find answers for you.

* Support children's concern for people they do not know. Children often are afraid not only for themselves, but also for people they

do not even know. They learn that many people are getting hurt or are experiencing pain in some way. They worry about those people and their well being. Explore ways to help others and ease the pain.

* Look for feelings beyond fear. After reassuring kids, don't stop there. Studies have shown that children also may feel sad or angry. Let them express that full range of emotions. Support the development of caring and empathy.

* Reestablish routine as soon as possible. Getting back to a normal schedule helps reassure children that their world can again be predictable.

* Help children use creative outlets like art and music to express their feelings. Using art, puppets, music, or books might help children open up about their reactions. They may want to draw pictures and then destroy them, or they could want to display them or their reactions. They may want to be flexible and listen.

* Help children and youth find a course of action. One important way to reduce stress is to take action.

This is true for both adults and children. Children may want to

write a letter to someone about their feelings, or send money to help victims.

* Take action with them. It is not enough to let children take action by themselves. Children who know that their parents, teachers, or other significant care givers are working to make a difference feel hope. They feel safer and more positive about the future. So do something. It will make you feel more hopeful, too. And hope is one of the most valuable gifts we can give children and ourselves.

- 5.) The 4-H club members name, age, FULL ADDRESS, county, area, teacher, school and grade must be affixed to the back of the poster board in the upper left hand corner.

APPENDIX A

ROCKCASTLE COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT PUBLIC NOTICE

Notification of Rights Under FERPA for Elementary and Secondary Institutions and Child Find

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") who are attending a postsecondary institution certain rights with respect to the student's education records. They are:

- 1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within forty-five (45) days of the day the District receives a request for access.

Parents or eligible students should submit to the school principal/designee (or appropriate school official) a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The Principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.

- 2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of the student's privacy or other rights.

Parents or eligible students may ask the District to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate, misleading or in violation of privacy or other rights. They should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of their privacy or other rights.

If the District decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the District will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

- 3) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception which permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel), a person serving on the school Board, a person or company with whom the District has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist), or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

Upon request, the District discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll or to other entities authorized by law.

The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA is:

"Directory Information" is information contained in an educational record which would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. This information may be released without consent. "Directory Information" includes the student's name, address, telephone listing, date of birth, place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended. The parent, guardian, or eligible student currently enrolled may request that all or part of the "Directory Information" be withheld. The request must be made in writing to the Principal of the child's school within thirty (30) calendar days after the Annual FERPA

Notice has been distributed in August. The written request must specifically state what information may not be classified as "Directory Information".

The Rockcastle County School District keeps educational records in a secure computer system and in locked files in each school and Board of Education office.

For students who have been determined eligible for programs for Special Education, educational records will be destroyed at the request of the parent when they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. The Rockcastle County School District may destroy the educational records of a child without a parent's request seven (7) years after they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. Parents are advised that data contained in the records may later be needed for Social Security benefits or other purposes. The Rockcastle County School District may retain, for an indefinite period of time, a record of the student's name, address, telephone number, grades, attendance record, classes attended, grade level completed, and year completed.

Children determined eligible for Special Education include those children with disabilities who have a hearing impairment, visual impairment, emotional-behavioral disability, deaf-blindness, other health impairment, specific learning disability, mental disability, multiple disabilities, speech or language impairment, developmental delay, orthopedic impairment, autism, or traumatic brain injury, and who because of such an impairment need specially designed instruction and related services.

The Rockcastle County School District has an ongoing "Child Find" system, which is designed to locate, identify and evaluate any child residing in a home, facility, or residence within its geographical boundaries, age three (3) to twenty-one (21) years, who may have a disability and be in need of Special Education. This includes children who are not in school; those who are in public, private, or home school; those who are highly mobile such as children who are migrant or homeless; and those who are advancing from grade to grade, who may need but are not receiving Special Education.

The Rockcastle County School District will make sure any child enrolled in its district who has a disability, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided an appropriate education at no cost to the parents of the child.

Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to help the Rockcastle County School District find any child who may have a disability and need Special Education services. The District needs to know the name and age, or date of birth of the child; the name, address, and phone number of the parent or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if Special Education is needed.

Letters and phone calls are some of the ways the Rockcastle County School District collects the information needed. The information the school District collects will be used to contact the parents of the child and find out if the child needs to be evaluated or referred for Special Education services.

"Child Find" activities will continue throughout the school year. As part of these efforts the Rockcastle County School District will use screening information, student records, and basic assessment information it collects on all children in the District to help locate those children who have a disability and need Special Education. Any information the District collects through "Child Find" is maintained confidentially.

Written Policies and Procedures have been developed which describe the District's requirements regarding the confidentiality of personally identifiable information and "Child Find" activities. If, after fifteen (15) working days, the Director is unable to find someone, (e.g., by contacting surrounding colleges and universities) to appropriately translate the notice, then the Director contacts the Kentucky Department of Education, in writing, for assistance in securing the necessary translation.

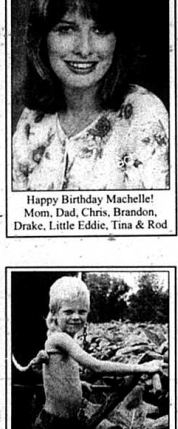

Ordinance #6-2001

An Ordinance levying the annual ad valorem tax on motor vehicles for city purposes in the corporate limits of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky.

Whereas, KRS 13A.130, 140 and 150 require that the legislative body, by ordinance, provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government, and

Whereas, KRS 132.487 and 132.488 requires submission to the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet prior to October 1 of each year the annual tax rate to be levied on motor vehicles and motorboats.

Now therefore Be It Ordained by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

Section One: Tax Levy on motor vehicles and motorboats

An ad valorem tax rate of .167 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of motor vehicles and motorboats subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

On and from: Due Date, Payment and Penalty

All ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorboats shall be collected by the Rockcastle County Clerk in accordance with the provisions of KRS 134.800 and other applicable statutes. B. Ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorboats shall become due and delinquent as set forth in KRS 134.810 and such taxes not paid when due shall be subject to the penalty and interest as specified therein.

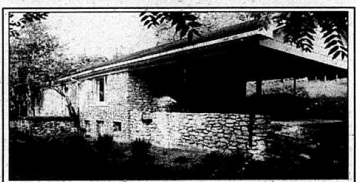

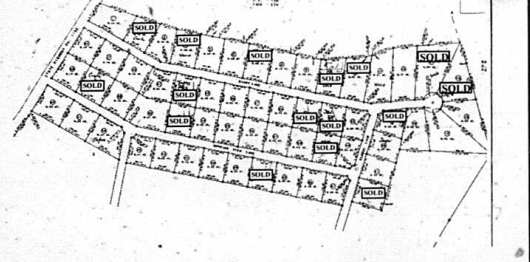

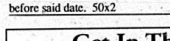

Mt. Vernon High School Reunion

Asterisks & Gold Stars

On Saturday evening, September 8th, a hundred eighty some odd of us gathered at the Rockcastle County Middle School to celebrate our annual reunion of the old Mt. Vernon High School. Two classes were honored: the Class of 1951, who had graduated fifty years ago; and the Class of 1968. A criterion of our group is that you must be graduates three years before you are invited. Our fraternity is unique in many ways but a particularly interesting distinction is that there are only four more classes to be added. Why? After 1972 the old Mt. Vernon Grade/High School was no more. We bowed to progress and change. Those graduating after that date would graduate from Rockcastle County High School. I had the honored distinction of being president this past year. Each year a group of us gather at least three times prior to the Reunion to make plans for the celebration. For several years I have been responsible for designing and producing the program. With the development of computers, to design the program I now sit before a monitor to set the type and place graphic images of the old school in their proper places. It is a tri-fold design. On one page we list the names of all the former presidents, beginning with Mr. John Lair. On another page we place the names of those who are fifty-year graduates. On a third page we add the names of the incoming class...now thirty-three years since graduation.

Asterisks! On these three pages we are careful to designate those who are deceased by placing asterisks before their names. Remember, we are a part of a long history of graduates, going back to 1910...or thereabout. We only list the "deceased" on the before-mentioned pages. So many asterisks now...just on these three pages! I can't begin to comprehend how many have gone before us.

At the beginning of our program, as is our tradition, I asked for those present to stand and we bowed our heads for a moment of silent commemoration. For some the moment is to remember those in our respective classes who may have died during the past year. Or, for some of us, we honor our entire heritage as much as possible.

Little did we know on Saturday night what would happen on Tuesday, September 11th. Around 9:00

a.m. news would begin to filter into Mt. Vernon...and the rest of the world about a "horrendous" terrorists attack on the World Trade Center in New York City, on the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., and a fourth strange crash of another commercial jet in Pennsylvania. As the news unfolded we would begin to hear words of remembrance about Pearl Harbor, "The day that will live in infamy." Before the day was over we would find out that it was, indeed, another day that will live in infamy.

I was seven years old when the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor. During the developing years of World War II, children would hear awful stories of death and destruction. All over America, in county-seat towns, huge memorials...giant billboards were erected to honor the service personnel from our respective counties. There beside the old Court House in Mt. Vernon, our patriotic citizens honored our "boys" by placing the names of all those who were "serving our nation around the world." Besides some of those names were gold stars. We were only gold stars, but we were told those gold stars represented special young men who had paid the supreme sacrifice, having given their lives in battle. Sometimes I would stand before that giant billboard in awe, and my eyes were riveted to the gold stars.

Some of us were in the Mt. Vernon Grade/High School Band. During those days of World War II, on Easter Sunday morning we would gather to honor the Risen Lord. Our band director was Mr. Bragg Thompson. Standing there in front of that memorial, in our thin, white trousers and second-hand maroon band jackets, we would play "Low In The Grave He Lay" as music to speakers talk about our "beloved dead." My undeveloped reasoning could not comprehend all that was going on. It was too awe-some, too sacred, too frightening to understand. It would not be until many, many years later, when in Easter Sunrise services that I would conduct. I would begin to understand! All the "beloved dead...who died in the Lord" would be resurrected as Jesus was resurrected. In that early time in front of the memorial I thought it would be especially true for those who had given their lives for America.

All of us there on Saturday night were remembering. Some were noticing the asterisks and sadness crept into our joyful gathering...a kind of...sweet sadness. The old Mt. Vernon High School had more uniqueness than any single person

could identify. Billy Hiatt read his "now famous" Ode to a Mt. Vernon Broadhead Basketball Game. As he read it we all went back to...The old gymnasium. It was sunken and around it were the hallways that were so familiar to all of us. There were a couple of rows of seats around the floor...on floor level, but many fans stood upstairs and a few sat around that balcony-kind of seating arrangement...where posts supported the structure. Large pull-down wooden shades were recessed above our heads. They could be pulled down for special occasions...plays...performances...dances when some privacy was needed. And the band played on the stage of the south end of the gymnasium. Early on the old scoreboard was simply numbers that could be turned to display the score. Later a lighted scoreboard was located in the southwest corner...manipulated by some scorekeeper...as I remember, Grant Taylor.

The old floor was uneven...sometimes loose and wavy. And Charlie Hines was always there with his two huge mops, as he pushed them side by side, sweeping up the fallen popcorn and other "foreign objects" to make the floor safe for the awesome players. During the awful World War II, when there weren't enough men left in our community, men like Charlie Hines coached the basketball teams.

Asterisks and gold stars were significant to a patriotic group of Mt. Vernon graduates who remembered...kinda sadly...and very proudly. Someone mentioned the special teachers, the men and women who molded us into what we are. I think Glenn VanWinkle mentioned Mrs. Dorothy Landrum and smiles broke out everywhere. We remembered her snapping her fingers so loudly...and we were obedient to her provocative, innovative ways. Bill Landrum, Mrs. Ruth Blazer, Clyde Linville, Miss Myrtle Bryant, Albert Albright, Jack Laswell...on and on!

There on the program is a picture of the school we entered...at the front door...and progressed from one room, from one class to another...till finally we graduated. Looking at the front of that picture...the first room to the left was the first grade...and some of us remembered Ruby Bullock, our first teacher. To the right...the first room was the second grade and some of us remember Shirley Chrisman. The next room to our right was the third grade room.

Mrs. Nancy Helton was our favorite teacher and she moved with us the next year to the second room to the left from the front door...and grade four. Over there to the right, when entering the front door...behind the basketball goal was fifth grade...and Ruby Riddle...and the beautiful birds she drew on her blackboard. Her sister, Hazel McKenzie, taught way over there behind the stage...our sixth grade teacher. Then we moved to the west side of the gymnasium and the seventh grade. Rose Helton Jones was a remarkable teacher and we would always remember Kentucky history because of her projects, including the forts we made from match stumps. From there we went to the last room before entering the hallway to high school...the eighth grade...there on the northwest corner...and Albert Albright.

Asterisks! So many asterisks! Now after our most recent "day that will live in infamy," after September 11, 2001...our world has changed forever. Hopefully we'll meet again next year on the second Saturday in September. But it'll never be the same. It never is! And we'll never be the same because of the countless asterisks and gold stars.
