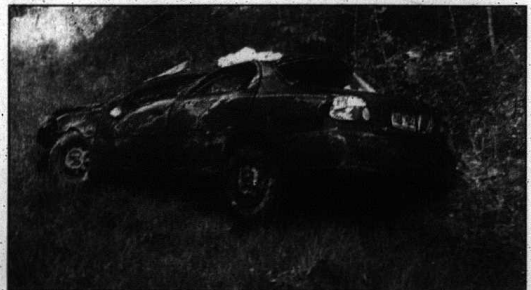

Many items on Tuesday's agenda Board agrees to purchase of new foodservice software

The Rockcastle County Board of Education approved a request on Tuesday night, by the school system's Food Service Director Jeannine Parsons, for the purchase of updated software for the breakfast and lunch program.

The board voted to spend \$43,000 for the upgrade on Ms. Parsons recommendation because the current system is "simply outdated," Parsons told the board.

City of Brodhead likely to contract with Sheriff

The Brodhead City Council will meet in special session next Monday to discuss the possibility of contracting with the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department for police protection in Brodhead, it was decided at Monday night's regular meeting of the council.

A few weeks ago, long-time Brodhead Police Chief Joe Bussell was forced to step down because he had not completed his required training at Eastern Kentucky University and his certification as a police officer was suspended by the Criminal Justice Department of the State of Kentucky.

Also on Friday night, starting at 6 p.m., the bluegrass band Just In Time will be performing.

Democrats Daniel Mongiardino, a State Senator from Eastern Kentucky, will face-off against David L. Williams.

"Voters should not confuse David L. Williams with Republican State Senator David Williams, president of the Kentucky Senate."

Rockcastle Court Clerk Norma Houk said Wednesday that the turn out for Tuesday's election will most likely be one of the worst ever in Rockcastle County voting history.

Holly Brown will also compete with her research paper, "Corps of Discovery: The Beginnings of Exchange."

The students competed at the regional level at Southwestern Palaski County High School in March where they placed first in both categories. Beth Cromer also competed at the regional and state level with her research paper, "Thomas Jefferson's

Legacy." She placed second at regional and received an Excellent overall rating at state. Only the first and second place entries at state qualify for nationals.

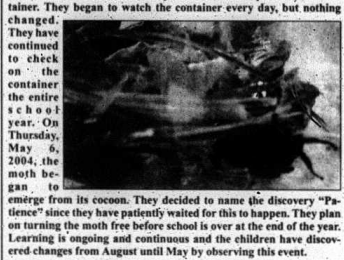

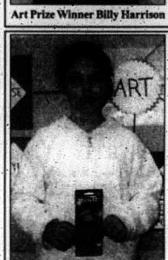

City of Livingston receives Operation Round-Up Grant

Downtown Livingston will soon have a new park, thanks to a grant from Jackson Energy's Operation Round-Up program. The city was awarded \$1,500 to help with the construction of the recreational area, complete with playground equipment and a shelter house, behind the former Livingston Elementary School building.

In addition to the Rockcastle County project, a \$250 grant was awarded to the Lee County Friends of the Public Library for a puppet show and \$500 was awarded to the McWhorter Volunteer Fire Department to purchase chain saws.

Jackson Energy kicked off Operation Round-Up last summer, and the volunteer board recently selected projects for funding.

The co-op is Kentucky's first to offer this voluntary program, which allows members to give back to their local community. They contribute to the fund each month and the extra money is used for community improvement projects in the area served by Jackson Energy.

"Operation Round-Up gives our members the opportunity to give a small amount each month to deserving individuals and organizations, located in the community we serve and in which they live," said Jack-

son Energy vice president of Customer Service, Rodney Chrisman. "Operation Round-Up works when co-op members voluntarily have their electric account rounded up to the next highest dollar amount. For example, if a bill was \$74.62 and the member had volunteered to participate in Round-Up, it would automatically be rounded up to \$75.

The additional 38¢ would go directly into the Round-Up account. The average contribution over time is approximately 50¢ per month.

The donated funds go directly into a trust account that can only be used for charity. This account is administered by a seven-member board of trustees and includes Sue Hamm of Rockcastle County who serves as secretary-treasurer.

Any individual or community group, with a worthwhile project, can apply for funding. The board of trustees has regular meetings to review applications.

"We are using the theme, 'The Power of One' for Round-Up," Chrisman added, "and ONE stands for Operation Round-Up. N eeds E veryone. This is a way for one person to make a difference in their local community for only pennies a day."

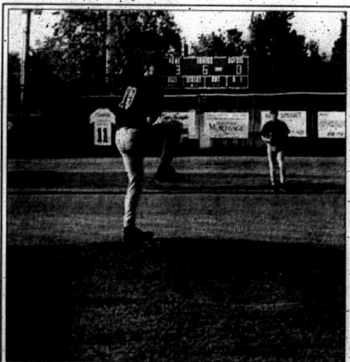

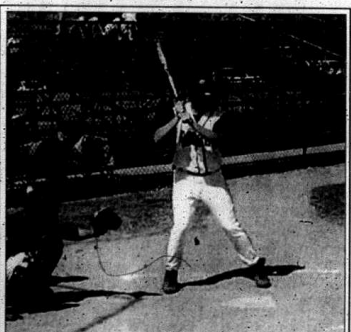

Agricultural News

Burley tobacco adjustments are reserve quota pounds for correcting and adjusting inequities in old farms with burley tobacco quota when the COC determines the quota is not equitable to the quota for similar farms in the county.

Farms receiving adjustments in any of the six previous years are ineligible for an adjustment unless approved by the State COC. Farms receiving a new quota for the current year are ineligible. The minimum shall not be less than 100 pounds unless the county's total allotment from the reserve is less than 100

pounds. Rockcastle County is projected 1845 pounds for the 2004 crop year.

Kentucky Phase II Amnesty
Since 2001, the Phase II Board has kept the same distribution plan for the Phase II monies. Part of that plan pays the Growing Farm and Grower/Tenant portion based upon the average of crop year 1998, 1999 and 2000 certified payment pounds. If a farm had available Grower/Tenant or Growing Farm payment pounds in any of those years and were not claimed, that farm would continue to not receive payment for those un-

claimed pounds. The amnesty program provides a final opportunity for those Grower/Tenant and Growing Farms to be included on future payments.

Claim forms will be sent beginning May 15, 2004 to Farm Operators of farms that did not claim all available Grower/Tenant and Growing Farm Payment Pounds for Crop Years 1998, 1999, and 2000. The Farm Operator will receive a claim form for each year that there were unclaimed payment pounds.

The Farm Operator will need to obtain the signatures and contact information from those that are described as Grower/Tenant and Growing Farms. After the claim form is returned and is certified, all those claiming payment pounds will be sent a letter indicating that they have been certified. They will then be included in the December 30, 2004 distribution.

Farming Operations Changed?
If you have changed your farming operations such as adding or dropping a farm you need to notify your local FSA County office. Changing operations may result in your needing to file a new AD-1026, updating your Farm Operating Plan for Payment Eligibility Review, CCC-502, updating your Adjusted Gross Income certification, CCC-526.

Maps
Due to new technology FSA is now updating farm producer maps by way of computer. Producers whose farms have been verified are now receiving maps in the mail with acreage listed on fields. Acreage listed on the map is what is considered cropland and does not reflect the farm's total acreage. If you no longer own this land please note that FSA cannot change the farm owner until the new owner brings their deed to the FSA office.

Farm Changes
Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA of-

the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership.

Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address.
