

cannot be used to impose legal disabilities imposed by conviction of a crime. By statute, this procedure may only apply once to a defendant.

The most underused statutory prevision permits persons upon written request to any law enforcement or public agency to "segregate" arrest records, fingerprints, photographs or other data relating to the arrested in files "separate and apart" from those of convicted persons. Upon receipt of such request, agencies must not only segregate the required records only segregate the required records but notify all agencies with whom it

but notify all agencies with whom it has shared such records to segregate such records and show on each record the disposition of the case. The practical effect of this provision is to make it more unlikely that a casual record search will disclose the existence of a prior charge and ensures that if disclose, the actual disposition—i.e., a dismissal—will be known. These statutes shonor jury verdicts of not guilty and ensure that defendants who were either mistakenly charged or for whom little or no proof guilt existed are not forever burdened by the albatross of a criminal record. These statutes also allow persons guilty of a single minor transpersion many years previously and gression many years previously and who have paid their debt to society to participate as citizens with un-blemished records.







"It serves as a predictor by giving forecasters an accurate sense of when and where storms tend to form so they can bet-

accurate sense of when and where storms tend to form so they can bet-ter advise people in that area." Bothwell said one of the driving forces behind the climatology comes from his interest in extreme lightning events with a large number of flashes. With this lightning prediction system,

With this lightning prediction system, forecasters can look at the probability of one or more lightning flashes in a 40 x 40 km grid box, equivalent to an average-sized county. They can also examine the probability of more extreme occurrences, such as 100 or more CG flashes in a grid box. These large flash events can be very dangerous and destructive to many types of electrical systems. In the United States, 20 to 25 million cloud-toground lightning flashes occue echycar and many of these CG flashes come from extreme lightning events.

These storms with large numbers come from extreme lightning events.
"These storms with large numbers of lightning flashes are dangerous and destructive by themselves," Bothwell said. "In addition, they are often associated with severe weather such as tornadoes, hail, wind and flooding."

Forecasters can use the lightning.

Forecasters can use the lightning climatology information, along with other observed and model data, to better pinpoint when and where lighning will occur. The NOAA Storm Prediction Center is currently producing experimental lightning forecasts extending three days into the figure.

The smell of popcorn and hot dogs was in the air and the reverberating sound of bouncing basketballs filled by gym. To the coach's left a squad of pretty cheerleaders clad in blue adomed with a golden 'L' were leading a chant that spelled out: B-L-U-E D-E-V-LISHISHISM, the coach imped from the stage onto the

The game did not go as planned as the young Blue Devils showed their inexperienced and folded in the late minutes. The following is an exate minutes. The following is an ex-cerpt of the account of the game as written by then Mt. Vernon Signal sportswriter Lyle Underwood;

"An underdog Tyner Quintet up-set the Livingston Blue Devils Fri-day Night in the season opener 55-57. The Tyner cagers surprised the Blue Devils from Livingston in the

season opener as they came from behind to clinch their second game of the season. Leading throughout the entire game, but not by more than six points at any time, the Livingston team fell short of victory. Despite the 30 point effort of freshman guard Paul Sturgill. The Typer cagers rallied in the last three minutes to hand Coach Parrot's boys a heart-brest-

Paul Sturgill. The Tyner cagers railed in the last three minutes to hand Coach Parrott's boys a heart-breaking defeat. Sturgill, making spectacular shots from the top of the free throw circle, gave the hometown crowd something to cheer about. Just a freshman, Sturgill promises to be one of the key men in the Livingston line-up.

Mr. Underwood's forecas of thure rang rue as Sturgill went on to become the team's leading scorer averaging a hefty 18.8 points a game. During the first ever Livingston Christmas Invitational, the freshman eventually wound up as high scorer of the tournament averaging 29 points per game, not bad for a freshman.

Ironically, the Blue Devils fini-shed their season as they began it with another loss to Tyner. This time the score was 71 to 59 with Surgill netting 34 points. 




