Rockcastle County Fish and Wildlife officer Steve Isaacs resigned his position last Thursday.

Colonel David Casey head of the state's Fish and Wildlife program confirmed Isaacs' resignation on Wednesday morning and said there is an ongoing investigation by the department on the events leading up to Isaacs' resignation.

Two thunderstorms came through Rockcastle County on Wednesday morning destroying a garage owned by Darrell Clifford on the corner of Paul Street and Terry Street in Mt. Vernon.

Clifford told Mt. Vernon firefighters that he was watching television around 5 a.m. when lightning struck, knocking out his set, and he returned to bed.

However the lightning strike hit his garage, as well as knocking out his televisions and VCRs, causing a

Grand Jury hands down eight indictments on Friday

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down eight indictments last Friday most for drug-related offenses.

A Dayton Ohio couple was among those indicted following a January 6th traffic stop by Kentucky State Police Trooper Scott Pennington on I-75.

According to court records Jason

Reed Poindexter, 41, and Judy Carman Richie 57, are accused of receiving stolen property, a firearm.

They were also indicted on charges of trafficking in Oxycodone, a scheduled two controlled substance with the intent to distribute, while in possession of the firearm.

The Grand Jury also returned indictments against the two for distribution of Hydrocodone,

Alprazolam, Clonazepam and Dizepam, all schedule six narcotics. They were also indicted on possession of drug paraphernalia. The indictment charges they had a syringe/needle, "which is used to introduce a controlled substance."

Pennington made the arrests after he clocked them speeding, according to the indictment.

Mt. Vernon Council allows five-acres for soccer fields

The agenda was light, considering it had been seven weeks since the Mt. Vernon City Council had met because of a change in their regular meeting date which took place this month.

The main topic of discussion for the council concerned allowing the use of five acres at Lake Linville, behind the VFW building, for soccer fields.

Rusty McAlister of Kentucky Rush Soccer requested use of the fields because of the county's central location for a 15 county area which participates in a soccer league operated by his organization. The field will be used primarily as practice fields but, McAlister said, there was a possibility that some soccer tournaments could be played here which would be of economic benefit to the county. Just using the fields for practice will provide some economic gain, McAlister pointed out to the council. He said there would be about

200 families, from other areas, coming into this area twice a week for team practices and that number could go up to 600 eventually. "These families will be spending money here, buying gas, food, etc."

The area is already used by the Hot Rods ball team and as a practice area for softball teams. Mayor Clarice Kirby said that arrangements would be made for continued use by these sports. "We are not interested in moving anyone out," McAlister added.

Some work will have to be done on part of the five acres, such as leveling the area and reseeded but McAlister told the council that his group was "not expecting this to cost the city any money."

Lynn Tatum, Rockcastle Economic Development Project Coordinator and part-time employee of the city as the Main Street Improvement Coordinator, told the council that

\$3.3 million is in state's new budget for Rockcastle

Over \$3.3 million will flow into Rockcastle County under the state budget approved Tuesday of last week by the State General Assembly, said Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon, and Senator Ed Worley of Richmond.

The funds will be spent on a variety of needs, including education, public safety, economic development and water concerns.

The budget includes \$100,000 for the Rockcastle Industrial Authority to purchase the historic Jones building on Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

The Rockcastle County Cultural and Tourist Center plans to move into the lower level of the two-story building, and there will be a museum upstairs telling the story of the "Wilderness Road" and the history of Rockcastle County.

The budget also includes \$1.5 million for the Rockcastle County Vocational and Technical Center, in addition to an \$8 million allocation for the center in the previous budget. The new funds are for a 5,300-square-foot addition to provide space for machine tool technology classes.

The addition is expected to open in late 2007. The center is located on

the campus of Rockcastle High School.

"This center is training our citizens for good-paying jobs with a future," Worley said. "This budget expands its scope into a new field."

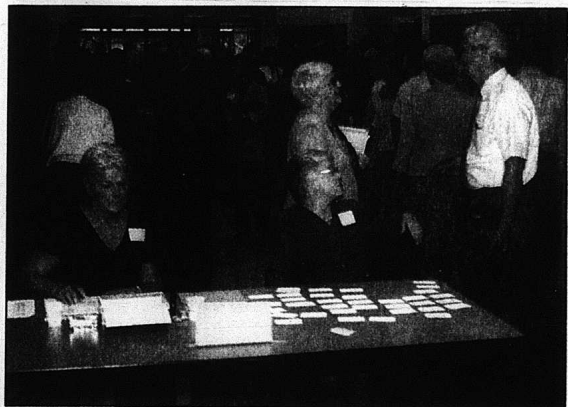
Over \$1.6 million in coal severance funds are included for the county. "Coal severance tax revenue is used for basic improvements throughout Kentucky, particularly in rural areas," Ford said. "I am extremely proud of these projects because they will improve the quality of life in Rockcastle County."

Public safety is a priority in the state budget. The budget provides \$17,500 for the Brindle Ridge, Brodhead, Livingston, Mt. Vernon, Quail and the Rockcastle fire departments for equipment. "We need to make sure our fire departments have the tools they need," Worley said.

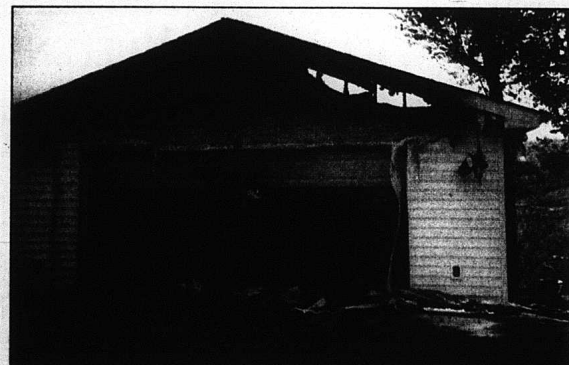
The budget does not neglect the arts. It provides \$243,800 for improvements to the Kentucky Music Museum and Hall of Fame.

Also included is \$40,000 for the reconstruction of the sidewalk on Lovell Lane in Mt. Vernon.

Can you remember when your family purchased their first television set? I will never forget when my mother brought ours home. I believe that the year was 1952 and I was eight years old. She and I were living in a small house on my grandfather's farm in Rockcastle County. I am sure she only made the purchase because of me. Some of my friends had TVs, and she wanted me to have the experience also. It was a huge wooden black and white set with large green knobs. We could only get two Lexington stations and occasionally one from Louisville - if the weather was just right. I thought it was the greatest invention known to man and was thoroughly mesmerized by the box full of people.

All day while at school, I could only think of getting home to watch my favorite afternoon shows. The first was Howdy Doody. The show came on at 5:30 on channel 18 (NBC) and was only a half-hour show. Howdy was a freckle-faced mari-

onette, and he was joined by his partners, "Buffalo Bob" Smith, Clarabelle the clown (who could only communicate by honking his horn), and Chief Thunderbird. The chief's famous salutation was "Kowabunga!" The show began by asking, "Say kids, what time is it?" Then he would reply, "Its Howdy Doody time!"

In 1955, the Mickey Mouse Club series premiered on ABC, and I fell in love with Annette Funicello. She captivated me with her singing and dancing. The show always started with the song:

*Who's the leader of the club
That's made for you and me?
M-I-C-K-E-E-Y-M-O-U-S-E!*

The show only ran for 3 years and 360 episodes. What clean, wholesome fun for elementary school age children! (Have you noticed recently what the kids of today spend their time watching? Oh my!)

Loretta argues that we absolutely must spray the lawn and surrounding two acres with some sort of herbicide and kill off the dandelions while we still have a remote chance of not being eaten alive by them.

In the meantime, I'm looking for a dandelion wine recipe and not worrying too much about the lawn.

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Benefits of Cardiac Rehab

Cardiac rehab is walking on a treadmill and peddling an exercycle. And much, much more. It involves a full evaluation of heart disease risk factors and often a significant change in life style.

Millions of Americans qualify for cardiac rehab because they have had a heart attack, angioplasty or bypass surgery. Millions more who have angina or are at high risk for heart disease would also benefit from a cardiac rehab program.

Following a medical evaluation, a person begins a supervised, graded exercise program with a variety of exercises using different muscles, groups and physical activities. The length of exercise and the degree of exertion are gradually increased.

Dietitians and educators can evaluate your risk factors, such as high cholesterol or high blood pressure, and recommend changes in your diet. Diabetes is often a factor in heart disease, and tight control of the blood sugar is important.

Often the most important life style change is to stop smoking. It is one of the most significant risk factors and is entirely unnecessary. Smoking cessation classes are highly recommended and medicines may help.

Counseling about stress and resolving conflicts can be very important. The basis of cardiac rehab, however, is a graded exercise program which safely trains the heart, blood vessels and musculoskeletal system to work more efficiently and tolerate greater exertion without precipitating symptoms. The benefits a person attains include an increased exercise tolerance, an improved sense of well-being, a decrease in symptoms, less stress, and a longer life.

Plainly Speaking: Kentucky Judges and Evolving Standards of Speech

Until recent years, judges were severely limited in expressing personal views on any subject which could be remotely connected to their official responsibilities. Significant court decisions concerning judges' right to freedom of expression have significantly altered the nature of permissible speech.

Generally, two types of speech were traditionally foreclosed to judges and judicial candidates. First, judges or candidates could not announce their views on disputed issues and second, they were prohibited from making promises regarding future judicial conduct. These rules were widely viewed within the judiciary as necessary to protect the independence and integrity of the office. The

effects though, were severe and not only for individual judges.

Not only were judges required to exercise a great deal of discretion in making any public comment about an issue or controversy, but the public was deprived of learning anything of substance regarding a particular judge or candidate's views. It's kind of hard to have an informed electorate when the rules prohibit a judge or judicial candidate from saying what he believes in or what he intends to do when elected.

Since 2002, the rules of conduct which governed judicial speech have changed. The Supreme Court determined that the rule precluding judges or candidates from announcing their views on disputed topics was unconstitutional. Hence, in this election year, judicial candidates may frankly discuss "hot button" topics with lessened fears of official reprisal from

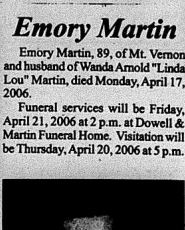

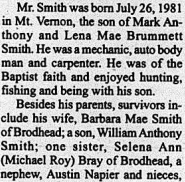

James "Tommy" Whitaker, 76, beloved husband for 58 years of Irene Stephens Whitaker, died April 8, 2006.

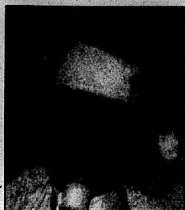

judicial disciplinary bodies.

The trend has already become readily apparent. As noted recently in the Herald-Leader, several Supreme Court justices have commented in public speeches on a wide variety of issues including Congressional animosity towards the judiciary and the status of foreign enemy combatants held in U.S. custody. In other states, and to a lesser extent in Kentucky, judicial candidates are more frequently expressing their commitment to particular views—usually those which appear to be most publicly popular at the time.

The problem with the developing case law and the dramatic shift in attitude is this: just because it's legal, don't make it right. It may be legal for a judicial candidate to publicly declare opposition to probation for certain offenders but the duty to decide each case on its merits and to assess each defendant as an individual is fundamental. Otherwise, what do we need judges for? It may now be permissible to publicly decry new environmental legislation, but aren't all litigants (including the EPA and factory owners) entitled to a judge committed to the idea of impartiality? The risk under new relaxed rules is that judicial candidates will promote populist views in order to get elected while ignoring the traditional independent role exercised by the judiciary.

A senior Kentucky jurist recently expressed the belief that we should continue to "decide the cases that are brought before [us] to the best of [our] ability based on the Constitution and laws of our nation and state despite the outcome being contrary to popular will." Well said.

All Americans are vested with the right of free speech, even lawyers vying for the bench. As with so much else which is said these days in public forums, simply because a judge or candidate can say it, doesn't mean it should be said.

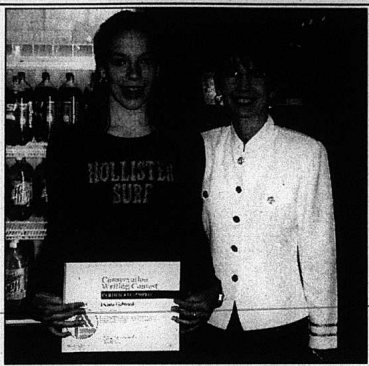

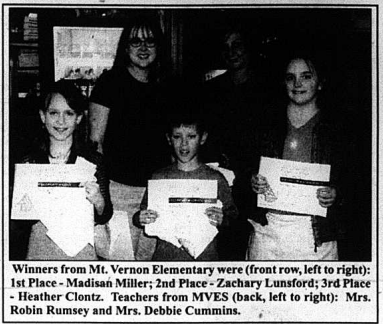

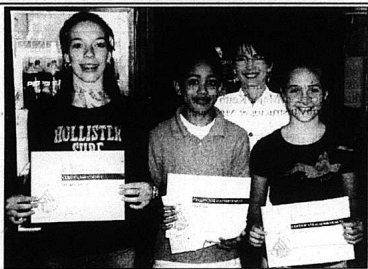

The public is invited to attend and anyone running for any office will be given an opportunity to introduce themselves and talk about the office they are seeking.

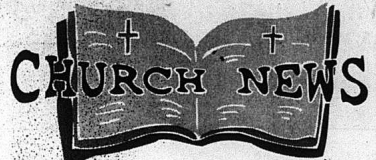

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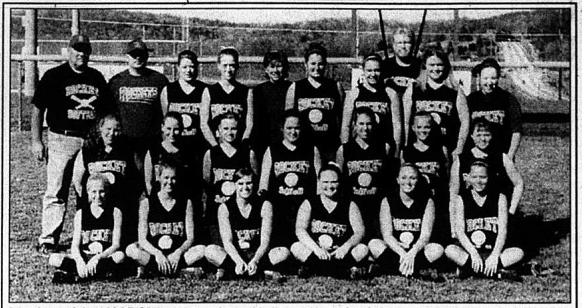

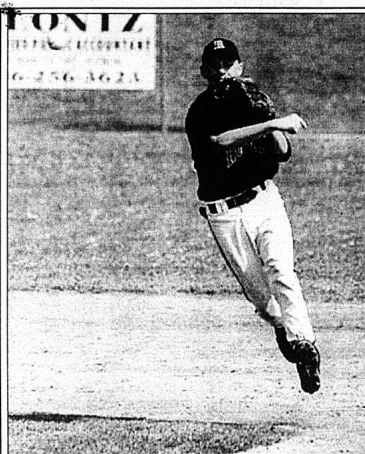
Brown gave up only two hits to the Somerset Briar Jumpers, but his teammates had four errors and Brown hit one batter with an errant breaking ball.

However, on Monday night the Lady Rockets won their first district game of the season against Casey County 10-0.

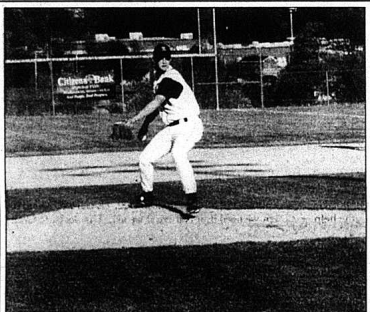
The Lady Rockets began their season in Florida, at the Cocoa Expo complex, where they dropped three

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EKU Americorps and UNITE sponsor drug awareness conference

Eastern Kentucky University's AmeriCorps, along with Operation UNITE, will sponsor a drug awareness and education conference for middle and high school students on Monday, May 1.

The first-ever "Uniting Students to Serve Conference" will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. at the Center for Rural Development in Somerset. The conference is free but registration is required. It is open to students and faculty of middle and high schools in the 5th Congressional District, as well as the ECU's primary service region.

Schools included in these districts are: Barbourville, Bell County, Casey County, Clay County, Corbin, Estill County, Garrard County, Harlan Independence, Harlan County, Jackson County, Knox County, Laurel County (North and South), Lincoln County,

Madison County, McCreary County, Middleboro, Monticello, Pineville, Powell County, Pulaski County, Rockcastle County, Science Hill, Somerset Christian, Wayne County, Whitley County and Williamsburg.

"The goal of this conference is to provide students with drug awareness and drug education," said Nancy Thames, director of ECU AmeriCorps. "For middle schools students, we're focusing on prevention and for high school students, it's intervention. We want to provide them both with information and ways to deal positively with situations that could lead to drug use."

Students will attend three educational sessions during the conference. During the first session, students will hear from a young adult who has recovered from a drug addiction. The...

other two sessions will cover topics of what students can do in their schools to work against drugs, as well as how to create clubs with such goals.

Students will also hear from keynote speaker Rep. Hal Rogers, who implemented Operation UNITE in his congressional district. Jeff Sheppard, former University of Kentucky basketball player, will also talk to students about being leaders against drugs in their schools.

Faculty and staff members in attendance will also participate in an informational session on how to encourage and lead students toward

anti-drug programs.

"We hope that the students learn facts of drug abuse, drug awareness and the devastating effects that it can have on their lives and those around them," said Thames. "We want them to be motivated to go back and establish and/or work to build clubs, as well as be inspired to be leaders in their schools in these programs. We want them to go back and make a difference among their peers."

Judges attend conference on traffic safety and DUI

District Judges Jeffrey Scott Lawless and Kathryn Gregory Wood, who serve Pulaski and Rockcastle counties, attended the 2006 District Judges Conference on Traffic Safety hosted by the Kentucky Court of Justice. The conference was held March 26-29 at the Embassy Suites Hotel in Lexington, Ky.

"Impaired driving almost always affects innocent people and results in some of the most complex cases for judges to handle," said District Judge Steve D. Hurt, president of the Kentucky District Judges Association, vice chief regional district judge for the Third Supreme Court District and chief district judge for Cumberland and Monroe counties. "This conference offered practical guidance on how to handle cases involving impaired and illegal driving."

The conference was funded by a grant from the Kentucky Governors' Highway Safety Program, which receives federal support from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). NHTSA recommendations have become the foundation for Kentucky's DUI Gold Standards Program. Judges, prosecutors and other law enforcement professionals developed the Gold Standards Program as a means to improve highway safety and reduce impaired driving. During the conference, judges took part in sessions related to many of the Gold Standards, including presentations on promising judicial practices for fighting

hardcore drunk driving, commercial motor vehicle standards and DUI, pretrial monitoring and risk assessment for DUI cases, and judicial outreach in underage drinking cases.

Those presenting at the conference included William P. District Court is a court of limited jurisdiction which hears civil cases involving \$4,000 or less, non-felony criminal, juvenile matters, city and county ordinances, misdemeanors, cases relating to domestic violence and abuse, guardianships for disabled people, probate of wills and felony preliminary hearings. The Small Claims Division is part of District Court's jurisdiction and informally handles matters with a value of \$1,500 or less. The Administrative Office of the Courts in Frankfort supports the activities of more than 3,400 Kentucky Court of Justice employees, including elected justices, judges and circuit court clerks.

"Sue is my best friend," Wanda told me. (All characters are pseudonyms.) "We do everything together. I tell her how her father has hurt me. She understands like no one else. I confide in her and she confides in me. She would rather spend time with me than with her friends. I don't know what I would do without her." Sue is Wanda's eleven year old daughter.

"You treat your child more like an adult than a child," I pointed out to Wanda. "How do you think this is affecting her?"

"I think it is good for her," Wanda answered. "She is learning about life and responsibility at a young age. She is much more mature than her friends."

"Do you see any possible negative effects?" I asked Wanda. "She thought for a moment. 'I don't think so,' she replied. 'It seems to me it will help her later in life.'"

Sam has had several affairs over the fifteen years they have been married. Wanda has no qualms about discussing all the details with her eleven-year-old daughter. Sue has little to say to her father because she blames him for the tension in their home.

"Wanda," I said, "let me raise a couple of issues to think about. One is that Sue is learning to take care of people at an early age. In some ways she sounds like she is your conscience."

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lor. Eleven year olds who counsel their parents have the situation reversed. It is much better if the parent is the counselor to the child."

"But I do counsel her," Wanda objected. "She talks to me about all her problems."

"My concern is that Sue is growing up to be someone who finds her identity in taking care of other people," I explained. "She could end up in relationships with people who need taking care of. She may marry someone with an addiction problem." Sue looked shocked.

"Also," I continued, "she may be missing out on childhood. Children who grow up too quickly miss out on the opportunity to be a child. An eleven-year-old who handles too much responsibility does not get to play and grow the way children need to."

"Now I am not saying you need to stop talking to your daughter," I added. "But perhaps you can find an adult to confide in about your problems with Sam. Talking to a counselor may be just the outlet you need. This will take part of the burden off Sue."

I could tell Wanda did not like what I had said. As she continued to be quiet, I asked her what she was feeling. "I don't like your insinuation that I am not being a good parent to Sue. She is all I have and we are going to stick together. Maybe if my husband would talk to me, I wouldn't have to confide in her, but he's not going to do that. I need her."

Wanda never came back to counseling after that. Perhaps I spoke too bluntly. Perhaps I should have waited until she discovered these truths herself. While I question my timing, I believe the basic truth of what I was saying to Wanda: children do not need to be put in the position of caring for their parents.

The danger in this is that the children will grow up to be codependent. Codependents are fixers and caretakers. They want to help and often end up in relationships with people who need a great deal of help. Codependents try to fix these people and find it very frustrating when the addict continues to be an addict in spite of all the codependent's efforts.

What is happening to Sue is not uncommon, but kids need to be kids. Having to grow up too quickly can be a hindrance rather than a blessing.

Brackett's farm, it was two other Fish and Wildlife officers and Brackett thought it was Isaacs. Isaacs arrested Brackett the next day on charges of terroristic threatening and wanton endangerment.

The officers said Brackett shot over their heads and then called the Fish and Wildlife Department in Frankfort to threaten Isaacs.

Brackett filled a \$50,000 property bond on Monday and will have a preliminary hearing on May 22nd. He spent two weeks in the Rockcastle County Detention Center.

Isaacs has been a fish and wildlife officer since January 3, 2003, according to Colonel Casey.

developing the fields for use by soccer teams could possibly open up some grant money for recreation.

Tatum said she envisioned adding saddle boats to the lake, walking paths and a recreation structure among other things.

McAlister said the fields would also be used for soccer camps.

In other business, the council received the police report for March from Asst. Chief Eddie Delaney who reported: eight D.U.I. offenses; four seatbelt violations; one child restraint violation; 15 speeding citations; five suspended operators license violations; 17 other offenses; 10 drug-related arrests and 13 wanted persons located.

28 were arrested during the month (94 total since January 1st); 10 investigations were opened with seven being cleared and nine traffic collisions were investigated with zero injuries reported.

The report also noted that the police department had started the Highway Safety Grant overtime and will also purchase two additional radar units through the grant.

The council also accepted the only bid received for the 2005-06 audit. Craft Noble and Co. submitted a bid of \$14,700 for a complete audit, including any federal grant money received that requires auditing. If there is no federal grant money that needs auditing, the cost of the audit will be \$11,700.

Poindexter, who is still being held under a \$50,000 cash bond, was also indicted for operating a motor vehicle on a public highway in excess of the posted speed limit, for a driver's license and no insurance on his vehicle.

Ritchie has been released from jail, after posting a \$5,000 cash bond. Both have a court date on June 23rd.

Jackie Rayburn, 44, of Rt. 2 Mt. Vernon, was indicted on charges of possession of Oxycodone, a schedule two controlled substance and trafficking in a controlled substance. The indictment was returned after Rockcastle County Sheriff's Detective Matt Bryant presented the case to the grand jury. He is due back in court on June 23rd and was released on a \$500 bond after his arrest.

Loretta Whitaker, 38, of Lime Plant Hollow Road, Mt. Vernon was indicted for selling Oxycodone to a confidential informant and for being a persistent felony offender. The alleged incident occurred last July 18th. Her bond was set at \$50,000 cash or property. Her next court date is June 23rd.

Jackie McCormick, 44, of Rt. Mt. Vernon was indicted on three counts of selling Oxycodone to a confidential informant. The charges are from three different dates on July 25, July 26 and August 1st of last year. His bond was also set at \$50,000 cash or property and the case was also worked by Harris.

Norma Combs, 57, of Locust Street, Mt. Vernon was indicted on a charge of selling Hydrocodone, a schedule III controlled substance and having medicine not in its original container. She is due in Circuit Court on June 9th.

Melvin Smith, 42, of Dusty Trail Subdivision, was indicted on a charge of fourth degree assault and pled guilty on Monday. He was given a probated sentence of five years, or order to pay restitution to the woman living with him, Michelle Rool and fined \$500, according to Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds.

Gerold Polk, 29, of Simpson Road, Brodhead was indicted on two different counts of failure to pay child support. In the two cases, he allegedly owes \$7,500 in back child support. He will appear in court on April 9th.

from Operation UNITE purchased 10 hydrocodone pills from Newland at his residence in Rockcastle County, according to UNITE prosecutor David Dalton.

On May 19, 2005 and June 8, 2005, the informant purchased what he believed to be methamphetamine from Newland. Lab testing later revealed that Newland had sold non-controlled substances - fraudulently holding them out to be methamphetamine. Selling phony controlled substances is a misdemeanor in Kentucky, Dalton explained.

Newland entered guilty pleas to all charges.

Newland waived his pre-sentence investigation and was sentenced to one year imprisonment. By law, the one year sentence runs concurrently with the felony sentence. However, this one year sentence will run consecutively to a prior conviction for second-degree assault, for a total of six years imprisonment.

The budget provides \$1.1 million for the Lake Linville Sewer Extension and \$120,000 to add four-inch water lines on KY 1329 for a distance of four miles.

"Providing clean and safe drinking water to Central Kentucky has always been one of my top priorities," Ford said. "Water is essential for life. People in other parts of the state take clean drinking water for granted."

The coal severance tax is five percent levied on every ton of coal mined in Kentucky. Legislators in both the Senate and House work hand-in-hand with local county officials in targeting projects for the coal severance dollars.

The budget will now be sent to the Governor for his signature.

 - 3) Our courthouse is widely recognized as the cleanest in the state. To those who think this is really not necessary, my response is that all taxpayers deserve to see their courthouse property in good, clean order.
 - 4) A number of offices have been completely renovated and expanded by the county - including the county clerk's and sheriff's offices.
 - 5) Two former courtrooms have been renovated and now house an emergency services office and emergency meeting room, while another provides space for the Development Office and Industrial Development Authority.
 - 6) I began the program whereby our work release inmates pick up old flowers when removed from cemeteries.

 - 4) The county has had more contact, cooperation and work with local agencies and city governments than ever in the past.

One of Rockcastle's Earliest Citizens

Colonel James Dysart: Soldier, Statesman & Pioneer

 "There she be Laddie, there she be." The emotions must have been overwhelming for the eighteen year-old youth that day in 1762 when his British schooner came within sight of the coast of Colonial America. James A. Dysart (1744-1818), the sixth of eight children, was born of Scotch and Irish stock. He was the son of Samuel and Frances Anderson Dysart.

His parents having died when he was a young boy, James and his younger siblings, Jane and Samuel, were reared by their grandparents at the Dysarts' ancestral home, Brook Hall in Duncraig, Northern Ireland. James received the rudiments of a common English education while at Brook Hall. When seventeen years of age, he decided to visit America. His grandparents agreed to furnish his means to defray his expenses there on condition he return the next season to finish his schooling.

With only his grandfather's letter of introduction and his inheritance, he had come to the new world to make his mark in this wondrous land of adventure that he had read much about back at Brook Hall. Landing at Philadelphia and determined not to go back to Ireland, he soon exhausted his inheritance. After spending eight years toiling as a planter in Pennsylvania and needing money and seeking adventure, he traveled to southwest Virginia and signed on as a long hunter under Colonel James Knox's Company. Perhaps no group in our history has contributed so much knowledge of the early western pioneer topography than Knox's Long Hunters.

In the annals of American history there is no braver lot than these early hunters. Not only did they endure the rigorous winters in crude shelters but the danger of sickness, privation, exposure, hunting accidents and, the very real and ever present danger, of being scalped by Indians. They were looked upon as heroes of Indian hunting grounds, which they truly were. They also were the forerunners of the ever-spreading, land-clearing, soil-tilling settler.

An interesting account of Dysart as a Long Hunter is found in Dr. Lyman C. Draper's book "The Life of Daniel Boone," (edited by Ted Franklin p.261). "At another time, Dysart was hunting alone when, coming to where a double or forked tree had fallen in opposite directions, leaving a passage between the sun-dried trunk and roots sufficiently large for an ordinary trail, he attempted to pass through; but just as he entered the narrow defile, he suddenly encountered a large bear. The bruin seemed determined not to turn

his back upon his foe and, instantly raising himself upon his hind feet, seized hold of the breast of Dysart's coat. Dysart, possessing great muscular strength, made a violent push against the animal, when the coat gave way and the bear fell hurriedly backwards eight or ten feet; and recovering himself, he stood for a moment sturly eyeing the young hunter who had just handled him so roughly, which gave Dysart barely time to raise his rifle, at the crack of which the huge bear bit the dust and the long hunter was happily relieved from his perilous situation."

Just why was this particular group of men given to hunting, instead of tilling the soil as most settlers? The answer is simple; money. It was not uncommon for a hunter to realize six to ten to seventeen hundred dollars for his season's take. This was far in excess of what he could earn in almost any other lucrative endeavor. In only two seasons with Knox, James soon led and traveled down the Little Holston River to speculate for land.

In 1770 Dysart chose to settle in Abingdon which later became Washington County, Virginia. James soon tilled the soil as most settlers and became an influential member of the community and in 1775 married Nancy "Agnes" Beattie (1754-1833). Nancy was the daughter of John Beattie, a very eminent man of those parts. As part of her dowry, Squire Beattie gave the newlyweds a large farm next to his where James built a huge two story double log house. He called his home Brook Hall in memory of his Irish home. James also acquired other land, 2,000 acres on Moccasin Creek. When the area was later incorporated as Washington County, James was elected its first Sheriff and commissioned to build the courthouse and jail. With the profits, he built a mill and distillery on Moccasin Creek and became quite well-to-do. While at Brook Hall, he and Nancy had six children. James was also one of the signers on the petition that called the first minister, the Rev. Charles Cummings, to the Sinking Springs Presbyterian Church at Abingdon.

In 1776 the war for American Independence began and James received a captain's commission in the Regular Continental Army. Captain Dysart made quite a reputation for himself at the Battle of Kings Mountain (7 Oct, 1781), where, although being wounded, he led a militia company of Virginia volunteers. The Patriots faced a brigade of Loyal Tory Americans under the command of Colonel Patrick Ferguson (regular British officer), a Scot known for in-

venting the breech loading Ferguson rifle. Ferguson, a strong disciplinarian called "Bulldog" by his troops and known as a "High-minded Highlander" with a bad attitude. He looked down on the Americans, calling them, "A bunch of backwater men... a set of mongrels."

During the battle Colonel Ferguson had his men entrenched on a lofty plateau atop Kings Mountain in South Carolina. Colonel Isaac Shelby (who later became Kentucky's first governor) commanded the brigade of Virginia and Tennessee men that approached Ferguson's position from the north while Colonel Benjamin Cleveland, with Carolina militia (of which the author's egg-g-g-grandfather and namesake, David Owens, was a member), approached from the south.

Soon the Patriots completely surrounded Ferguson's lofty haven and proceeded to march up the steep inclines only completely route the Tories in one hour and five minutes of heavy action. Aftward British General Henry Clinton, speaking of the affair, called it "The first link of a chain of evils." He feared the loss would lead to the collapse of British plans to quash the Patriot Rebellion and he was right. Thus many historians consider Kings Mountain as the turning point in Colonial America's quest for Independence.

Later, as the war progressed, Dysart was promoted to major and then colonel, serving out the rest of the war in Pioneer service. After the conclusion of the war, Dysart returned to Brook Hall and continued a very prosperous business with his mill and distillery. Later he was elected with fellow Whig, Samuel Meek, to represent Washington County in the Virginia House of Delegates.

In 1800, he began to suffer a re-

versal of fortune. He was defeated by James Bradley in his bid to be elected to the House. He had fallen in disfavor of voters for voting against the Alien and Sedition Act and he began to encounter financial difficulties. While in office, he had agreed to sign promissory bank notes for constituents some of whom failed to pay off the debts.

In 1803, broken in health and discouraged over political and financial difficulties the Dysarts sold their holdings to pay the promissory notes. Dysart then applied for and was granted a War Land Grant in Kentucky. He and Nancy packed up their kitchen and working tools, as well as James' library of books, and headed out with their six slaves for Kentucky. Following Skaggs Trace in Rockcastle County, they selected a nice farm of 1,500 acres near a large double spring on Jones Creek (on Route 1250 off 461 Bypass, farm of Cecil McKinney). There, he again built a large double logged two-story house that had double hearted stone chimneys at each end that he again named Brook Hall.

Dysart soon became a very influential citizen in his new home. When Rockcastle County was incorporated in 1810, a General Assembly act provided for the establishment of the Rockcastle Academy to further the cause of education in the new county. Named on the board were Colonel James Dysart, William Carson, Captain William Smith, Absolom Renfro, John Burdette, Henry P. Buford, and Colonel Dysart's son, John Beattie Dysart. In 1815, at the advanced age of 71, Colonel Dysart was elected to a seat in the Kentucky House of Representatives.

Here James and Nancy lived out their lives contentedly. When a visiting friend commented on his isola-

tion in his wilderness home, Dysart answered, "I am never lonesome when I have a good book in my hands." He had, in time, collected quite a library and lived to enjoy it, dying May 26, 1918 at the age of 74. At the time of his death, he was described as, "A large, square-built, coarse featured man weighing two hundred pounds, fond of books and newspapers, and a professor of the

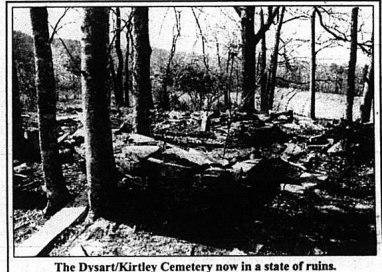
Christian religion."

After Colonel Dysart's death, his fifth child, Johnston (b.2-22-1787 d. 8-5-1826 married to Mary Ann Cowan) moved into Brook Hall with his family and provided care for his mother. Nancy "Agnes" Dysart lived another fifteen beside her husband in the Dysart/Kirtley Cemetery that rests on a picturesque wooded knoll.

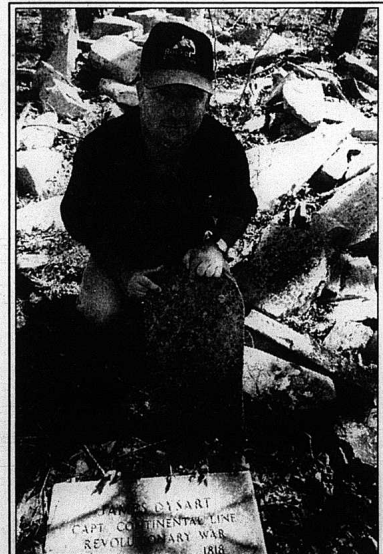

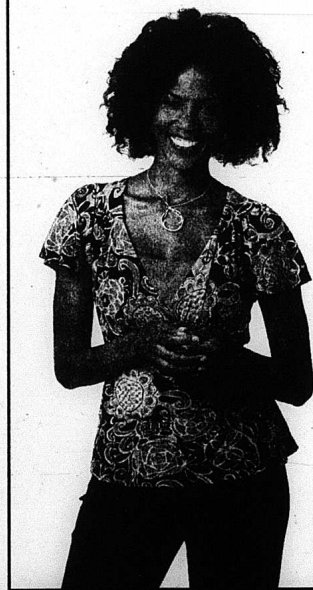


The Dysart/Kirtley Cemetery now in a state of ruins.





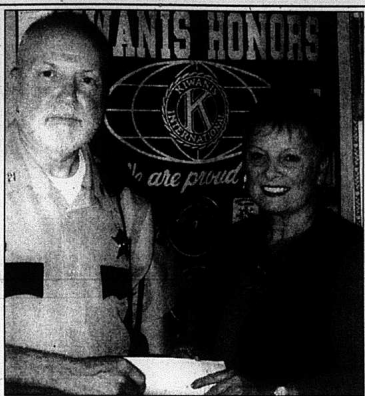

Passport application service available at local post office

New laws will soon require Americans to have passports when traveling to countries like Canada and Mexico. Getting a passport is quick, easy and convenient at the Mt. Vernon Post Office, according to Tina Rose, clerk.

"I recommend you come in as early as possible to apply for your passport, at least two months or earlier before your departure to avoid any extra costs to expedite your application," Rose said.

Normally, it costs \$97 for adults (16 years and older) with separate payments of \$67 paid to the State Department for the passport application fee and \$30 to the Postal Service for its processing fee. For persons under 16, the cost is \$82, with separate payments of \$52 and \$30, respectively. Two identical photos of each applicant are required, which the Post Office can take care of for a fee. For expedited passport service, add \$60 for each application.

Other tips include: Bring in proper proof of American citizenship or naturalization. This must be either: a state-issued certi-

fied birth certificate; a previous official passport or a naturalization certificate, if you are foreign-born. (Please note: a hospital-issued birth certificate is not acceptable).

Bring in one officially-acceptable state or government photo ID. This can be either a driver's license, a military photo ID or a state-issued photo ID. Workplace IDs and regular photos are generally not acceptable.

The passport application requires two recent identical photographs, which the Post Office will take for a \$15 fee. The photos must meet specific passport requirements.

To save time, download passport application documents at www.usps.com/passport and fill out beforehand. However, don't sign the application form, as the passport acceptance clerk must witness the signing.

Customers can go to <http://www.usps.com/> or call 1-800-ASK-USPS to get the location of passport Post Offices nearest them and their passport customer service hours.

near the old Brook Hall homeplace. Johnston Dysart, in the tradition of his father, also made quite a name for himself. He was heavily involved with Rockcastle politics, serving as sheriff and representative (Whig Party). During the War of 1812 (The Second War of Independence) Johnston raised a company of Rockcastle men and was elected its commander, becoming Captain of the 5th Company, 11th Kentucky Mounted Volunteers.

On October 5th, 1813 they participated in the Battle of the Thames, near Morgantown in Canada where Indian Chief Tecumseh was killed. There, a brigade of Kentuckians yelling, "Remember the River Raisin!" defeated British General Henry Proctor and his Indian Allies. The loss demolished both Proctor's Army and Tecumseh's Indian Confederation and hastened the British to sue for peace. Dysart's good friend William Whitley was killed in that battle. Captain Dysart later went on to be promoted to major and then colonel, just as his father.

Following the War Colonel Johnston Dysart returned to Brook Hall and farmed the plantation until he died August 5th, 1826 at the young age of 29 and was laid to rest near his father in the Dysart/Kirley Cemetery. James Dysart II (12-22-1817 to 1-8-1895) the eldest of Johnston and Mary Ann's children was only nine years old at the time of his father's death. Mrs. Dysart then managed the farm and over-saw the slaves until master James became old enough to entrust with the management of Brook Hall. When he was 27, he married Louis Elvira Harris, whose family lived on the neighboring farm. Following in the footsteps of his grandfather and father, he was also elected colonel of a state militia regiment made up of Rockcastle and Lincoln County men.

James continued to farm Brook Hall until 1850 when he uprooted the clan and moved to Buchanan County, Missouri, along with Judge William Carson and Larkin Kirtley's families. One source states they greatly feared Indian attacks but no harm befell them. They settled in Buchanan County where James farmed several hundred acres of land and became the minister of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. A history of the church by an unknown author recorded the following regarding Rev. Dysart: "Mr. Dysart is a genius in his way-singular and eccentric, yet gifted, forcible, and successful to a degree. There are a good many opposite and apparently, antagonistic traits in his character, yet, if these unruly elements ever come in collision, they only affect him, not from his great usefulness as one of the most successful revivalists of his

day." In 1861 his wife died and James enlisted in General Sterling Price's Confederation command, where he received a commission as a captain. During the Civil War, his house was approached by a Union Cavalry unit and they plundered his property. They took anything of value, including his grandfather's silver hilted sword that he had carried all through the Revolutionary War. James married Kate Martin in 1864 and they lived out their lives in Buchanan County and were buried alongside his first wife, Louisa Harris Dysart.

Presently, the Rockcastle County Cemetery Preservation Board has targeted the Dysart's final resting place as a future project. This very important part of Rockcastle's history was almost lost to time after the Dysart family moved west, following the 1849 Gold Rush. Fortunately, in May of 1974, Mr. John Lair published a short account of Colonel Dysart's life in his, "Rockcastle Recollections" column.

Shortly after that article appeared in the Signal, Chester Whitaker contacted Mr. Lair. Mr. Whitaker had remembered hearing stories of the "Old Dysarts" when he was a young boy and knew the location of the old cemetery. Together, Whitaker and Lair hunted through the worn markers and fieldstones until they found a rounded marker with the faint etching, "J.D. 1818."

Later, the Rockcastle DAR Chapter was asked to obtain a marker for this old soldier. On October 5th, 1986, a formal ceremony, with approximately sixty people attending including Dysart descendants, was performed to honor Colonel Dysart. Charles Griffin, a ggg-grandson, gave a short history of the patriots and Rockcastle DAR Chapter members contacted the dedication ceremony. Following a recent trip to the Dysart burial grounds, County Judge Executive

Buzz Carolotis said, "This cemetery deserves special recognition by the county and its [Cemetery] board for historical preservation." His comment was echoed by Rockcastle Economic Development Project Coordinator, Lynn Tatum, "Now, that we have rediscovered this prestigious pioneer cemetery, we have a responsibility to preserve it for future generations." Judge Carolotis hopes to see the cemetery restored so future generations of Rockcastle Countians can look back into history and be very proud of our heritage. The author extends his gratitude and thanks to land owner, Cecil McKinney, for allowing access to this historic cemetery.
