Arsonists set fire to Hardees

On Sunday afternoon Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Brindle Ridge firefighters were called to Hardee's Restaurant at Renfro

Mt. Vernon Fire Chief Garry Hansel said three young men came into the restaurant and were acting "bad" and told employees if they did not get service soon they would be sorry

Hansel said the three apparently went into the men's bathroom, punched a hole in the ceiling, stuffed paper towels in the hole and set them on fire.

Mt. Vernon Fire Department Public Affairs Officer Steve Griffin said the manager of the restaurant said that she thought she smelled plastic burning and sent a maintenance employee to examine unattended areas of the building. When he opened the door to the men's restroom it was full of smoke.

Stallsworth, who occupied the same position before Bullock, was hired on a week-toweek basis, will still work for Clifford Collins but will maintain Livingston's system in his off hours.

Stallsworth has filed suit in federal court against the City of Livingston, over his August, 2004 dismissal, claiming he was fired after criticizing the City for not having a full-time police officer.

The suit names former Mayor J.C. Griffin, who resigned June 27, 2005 and mem-

City Commissioner Phillip Doan queried the commission

members about Stallsworth's status at a meeting of the commission Friday afternoon. "Are we supposed to be training someone to take his place?" Doan asked.

Stallsworth came to the meeting later and Doan put the question directly to him. Stallsworth told the commission that he would do the job "as long as the present commissioners are in office and you

Stallsworth said that, so far, only three of the 11 water customers who had not paid their bill on time, had been disconnected. Seven of the past due customers paid and Stallsworth was scheduled to shut off a fourth customer, after the meeting. If a customer's water service is disconnected, it will be reconnected within 24 hours after the bill is paid.

Stallsworth also reported that due to repairs to the city's water plant equipment, the system was now running only 25 gallons a minute as compared to 50-60 gallons a minute before.

Commissioner Carpenter told the commission members that she had called a Wood Creek Water District official after reading a story in an issue of the *Lexington Herald-Leader* that quoted a Wood Creek official as saying that the city was still \$4,000 in arrears after making a \$10,000 payment follow-

Livingston fire station burns on Saturday

one in more ways than just the 90 degree temperature.

On Saturday, Livingston firefighters were called to a fire at one of their own fire stations, located on Main Street, after a deep fryer shorted out.

The call came from an anonymous caller who told 911 the fire was coming out the front of the building. The deep fryer was located near the front of the metal structure.

The fire department and Ladies Auxiliary had a fish fry planned for the afternoon and evening and had plugged up the deep fryer which apparently shorted out causing the grease in the fryer to catch on fire.

No one was in the fire station at the time of the fire which firefighters responded to at 7:41

Livingston Fire Chief Sam Stallsworth said his volunteer fire department extinguished the blaze with the use of a army truck which was inside the other fire station, located across from the station which caught fire. The department uses the army

tanker to fight forest fires. "We also used fire extinquishers, which were in vehicles of some of our volunteers," he said on Monday.

Stallsworth estimated the damage to the structure at \$45,000, which did not include the equipment inside the fire station. "Our breathing apparatuses were inside the building and they don't give that kind of equipment away. It will be several days before we know just what kind of dollar figure we can put on the total damage," he

Firefighters managed to get all three fire trucks out of the building, after the blaze was knocked down and immediately began cleaning the trucks which had smoke damage and debris≠ from the fallen ceiling on them.

"Our main goal was to make sure we could use the trucks if something else happened in our fire fighting district," he said.

Two of the trucks are currently being housed in the old fire station and Stallsworth said he had one at his home. There was no insurance on the build-





After a short time, Marty

moved to the counter to wait on a customer. While she was busy, I walked around the room looking at all of the gadgets and equipment lining the shelves and walls. I found a wooden record player with a 78 rpm record on the turntable. Marty

noticed me looking at it and

said, "David Joe, it still works!" In another counter I found a large collection of Case knives. (I had to restrain myself from reaching for my wallet to make a purchase.) Next time, I may have to buy one for my collection – especially since my first knife came from this same store 54 years ago. I also found a spade that I need because I recently broke the one that I have. The price was \$7.95. That is not a misprint.

When the customer had finished shopping and Marty had returned to sit and chat, another great friend of mine appeared. Her name is Shirley. It was almost like returning to high school. As we talked about our days together growing up, memories of my youth came rushing back.

About that time, a lady walked into the store and Shirley started to introduce the two of us. Before she could do so, I greeted the newcomer, "Hello Nancy." Marty commented that Nancy was from Broadhead, so how would I know her? Nancy said, "David Joe and I used to ride around in his '58 Chevy." The Mt. Vernon girls were more than surprised to learn that my cruising days

What is a Concussion?

Presented by Dr. Callie Shaffer

After an accident an individual may ask, "Was there a concussion?" Sometimes it is not clear whether or not there has been a concussion.

A concussion is when there is a sudden change in brain function due to trauma. Usually the doctor asks, "Were you knocked out?" If so, there has been a concussion.

But the change in brain function does not need to be a complete loss of consciousness. A concussion has occurred if there has been a disturbance of vision (such as double vision), loss of balance, or similar symptoms related to impaired brain function.

With a concussion, there normally has been no structural damage to the brain, such as bleeding. Neverthe-less, there may be long-term problems related to the injury, such as chronic headaches or dizziness.

In checking for a concussion, the doctor or coach asks questions to check one's orientation (what day is it?, where are you?) and memory (what did you eat for breakfast?).

There is a temporary loss of memory which lasts for minutes in mild concussions and for over a day in more severe concus-

In the hospital, the doctor will check for any abnormalities in sensation, muscle strength, balance and coordination.

If a person has severe or repeated concussions, he may develop a post-concussion syndrome consisting of headaches, dizziness, irritability and fatigue. This may last for several months

There is also the risk of serious harm from concussions if there are two or more concussions within a 1-2 month period.



for many children, foster placement is short-term, perhaps only a few days, but for many unfortunate children, temporary foster placement may involve months or even years in different foster homes.

There is, however, positive news for Kentucky childrenparticularly in our community. We are fortunate to live in a society which has the ability to remove children from dangerous environments and to provide corrective services to alleviate the circumstance which engendered the removal. Not surprisingly these days, many-if not most--forced removals of children are related to the serious abuse of drugs by parents. In most instances, trained professionals are available to help any family alleviate the condition which prompted the removal of children. Once that problem has been corrected, the children can be safely returned. Few societies are able to provide such protection for their

Statewide, the counties of this judicial Circuit fared quite well when compared against other areas in dealing with foster children. Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties fall within the Lake Cumberland foster care area while Lincoln County is within the rural Bluegrass region. Looking at recent statistics, it is readily apparent that our communities are doing something right.

In the Lake Cumberland area, foster children spend approximately 10.6 months in foster placement before reunification with their parents or some permanent placement occurs, such as adoptions. To any child, ten months seems like an eternity and the justice system needs to move much faster to

resolve these cases in a timely fashion. But, it is too much to expect that parents who are addicted to oxycontin or methamphetamine can receive effective substance abuse treatment in a much shorter period. Since the first goal of the state must always be to try to reunify a child with his or her parents, ten months is pretty impressive. Moreover, in most other regions of Kentucky, children stay in foster placements for much longer periods.

In both the Lake Cumberland and rural Bluegrass areas, social service agencies and the courts are very successful in reunifying families. Nearly 50% of all children are able to be reunited with their families following appropriate intervention. In some areas of Kentucky, reunification occurs in less than 40% of all cases.

And while the average costs of foster placements statewide exceed \$50,000 for every child who stays in foster care for more than thirty days, that figure barely exceeds \$30,000 in the Lake Cumberland area.

At a Circuit Court judge, I have little or no involvement in the majority of these cases. I wish I could claim some responsibility because these recent studies indicate that great strides are being made on behalf of our children. This news reflects positively on those judges who are primarily responsible for dealing with children who are abused, abandoned, neglected, or who--through no fault of their parents--are not adequately fed, cared for, or sheltered.

The courts, the underpaid and overworked social workers who deal with these frightened and fragile children, and the foster parents who provide safe, stable and nurturing temporary homes, deserve credit for making some progress in reducing the impact of forced removal upon our most valuable citizens. Much work, however, remains to be done. In the coming years, continued efforts need to be made to ensure that children are not unjustly removed from their parents, that removal occurs for the shortest possible duration, and that in those instances where parents refuse to address those behaviors which pose an actual risk of substantial harm to their children, that another permanent placement is quickly

Family Room By: Dr. Roy Don Whitehead

"After an abusive marriage, I promised myself that would never happen again, but it is!" Diane said in amazement. (All characters are fictitious.) "The last two men I've dated have both been abusive. They all seem so nice at first. How can I tell which ones are abusers?"

Over the last twelve years as a counselor at Bethany House Abuse Shelter in Somerset, I have been asked that question many times. Victims sometimes find themselves getting out of one abusive relationship and into another.

Even some very intelligent people do not know or do not see the warning signs that could alert them to the presence of an

Warning Sign #1 is jealousy. It may seem like love when he is very possessive and wants to know everything you did during the day. He may threaten another male who has talked to you or he may act hurt when you talk to your boss on the phone. That is not love; it is jealousy and it can lead to miserv in an abusive relationship. What seems so "sweet" at first becomes all-encompassing as he monitors your every move and threatens to kill you if you

Warning Sign #2 is his wanting to spend every moment with you. As the relationship progresses, you realize that he is so insecure that he cannot stand to be separated from you. He is afraid you will leave him if he lets you out of his sight. As with jealousy, this quickly becomes old, as you have no privacy and no life of your own.

Warning Sign #3 is his rushing the relationship along. He wants you to move in together after a month of dating or he wants to marry you after two months. Part of you is flattered by this kind of intensity and mistakes it for love. Another part of you realizes you need more time to get to know each other. Abusers seem to worry that they cannot maintain the "nice guy" facade for long so they must move quickly. Marrying him or moving in with him increases his control over

Warning Sign #7 is that, while you are madly in love, everybody else thinks he is bad for you. Other people can often see the abuse/control before you can. Listen carefully to what family and friends tell you. Do not accept their advice uncritically, but, if they are nearly unanimous in their disapproval, they probably see something that you do not. If they are not telling you anything, ask them for an opinion. Friends and family will sometimes say nothing because they do not want to say something negative about him. It is better to hear the negative before the wedding than six months after when the abuse has already be-

We are very pleased to provide you with this year's Annual Water Quality Report. We want to keep you informed about the quality of our water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide to you a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make continually to improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water remains at the highest level and the lowest price as we meet the needs of our community. Our water source is purchased water from the City of Mt. Vernon. The City's raw water source is surface water from Lake Linville located at Renfro Valley, Kentucky.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include microbial contaminants, inorganic contaminants, pesticides and herbicides, organic chemical contaminants, and radioactive contaminants. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems.

Water Supply Plan:

Our water is produced by Mount Vernon Water Works. Mount Vernon Water Works is located at Renfro Valley. Kentucky. Our supplier treats surface water sources. The source water assessment has been completed for our supplier and indications are that susceptibility to contamination is generally moderate. Areas of concern are agricultural activities, failing septic systems, highways and railroads. The use of pesticides and herbicides and the potential for chemical spills pose a threat to the water source. The complete source water assessment can be reviewed at Mount Vernon Water Works.

The Brodhead Water Works routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The table enclosed within shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2005.

Definitions & Terms:

Non-Detect (ND) - laboratory analysis

indicates that the contaminant is not present.

Parts per million (ppm) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000. Parts per billion (ppb) - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in

Action Level (AL) - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) - a measure of the clarity of water. We monitor for turbidity because it is a good indicator of the effectiveness of our filtration system.

Treatment Technique (TT) - - a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water. Maximum Contaminant Level - (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in king water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal - (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Picocuries per liter – (pCi/L) a measure of the radioactivity in water.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants. Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

The data presented in this report are from the most recent testing done in accordance with administrative regulations in 401 KAR Chapter 8. As authorized and approved by EPA, the Kentucky Division of Water has reduced monitoring requirements for certain contaminants to less often than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. 

tion, an attorney will be assigned to the project for the purpose of providing the Department a title abstract of each property's title.

They were also told that businesses or farm operations are entitled to receive payments for actual reasonable moving expenses plus qualified reestablishing expenses up to \$10,000. They were were also told that, under certain circumstances, the businesses and farm operators may be eligible to receive a payment of not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$20,000 in lieu of moving expenses.

They also told heads of nonprofit organizations that they are entitled to \$10,000 for actual moving expenses and may also be eligible for a lump sum payments.

Owners of homes, who have been owners for at least six months, are eligible for as much as \$22,500 for moving expenses and renters of rental property are eligible for \$5,250 in moving expenses.

However all transportation employees at the meeting, which was held at Maretburg Baptist Church, pointed out that there were no guarantees of the amount of money that an individual land owner would re-

Officials said that after rightof-way acquisition, 90 days would be given to landowners to move or re-locate and, before they are required to move, the state will give them a 30 day notice as to the exact date they must be gone.

Project manager Joe Cox said the buying of the right-ofways would probably begin this winter and construction on the approximately six miles of new Hwy. 150 would likely begin in the summer of 2008.

The cost of the right-of-way purchases is estimated at \$7.1 million and the cost of construction is estimated at nearly \$25 million.

A detailed map of the new road was on display Tuesday and all affected property owners were listed on the map.

There will be at least two new access roads as part of the project but the orginal Hwy. 150 will not be used.

"got hold of the official," he told her that the \$4,000 was \$900 left from the previous past due balance and May's bill which would be about \$3,100. Carpenter said that the \$900 had been paid earlier and that the city hadn't even received a bill for the May water service from Wood Creek when the story was printed. Even though the May water bill to Wood Creek is not due until June 15th, City Clerk Tina Tyree was directed to get a cashier's check for \$3,049 on Monday of this week to pay the current bill.

Carpenter noted that once the city meets a \$1,985 interest payment in July to Rural Water, then the city should be able to keep abreast of bills for the water department without having to continually use general fund monies.

In other action, the council passed a motion to institute a purchase order policy for all purchases.



Attorney John Gillum to attend the conference. Rockcastle County Detective Matt Bryant also attended.


