## Many Rockcastle residents charged in state drug bust

The largest drug roundup in Kentucky's history unfolded last week as state, local and federal officers stormed dozens of homes, in Eastern Kentucky, armed with felony arrest warrants for 518 people, striking at the heart of an illegal prescription drug trafficking organization.

'Operation Flamingo Road' is the culmination of a three year effort involving multiple law enforcement agencies that began with a KSP/FBI investigation focusing on individuals obtaining prescription drugs in Florida, then returning to Kentucky to distribute illegally.

The investigation involved at least 20 alleged drug dealers in Rockcastle County.

According to a news release from the Kentucky State Police, Kentucky law enforcement agencies have seen an increase in the number of prescription drug involved cases and began to notice a trend developing, which involved Kentuckians traveling

## Shots will be given at RCMS H1N1 vaccine clinic set for November 12th

The Rockcastle County Health Department has scheduled a free H1N1 flu vaccine clinic for November 12th.

The clinic will be held at the Rockcastle County Middle School on Thursday, November 12th from 4-7 p.m.

Health Department Nursing Supervisor, Angela Thacker said appointments are not required to get the shot or the mist.

"We are borrowing a lot of vaccines from our sister counties in the Cumberland Valley area and we hope we will be able to serve everyone," Thacker said.

Thacker said that the shots and mist will be given until supplies run out, but she also said that those who want the vaccine should not arrive at

the middle school before 3:45 p.m. so that the flu vaccine clinic does not interfere with school traffic.

Thacker said the only people who will not be given the flu vaccine are children under six-months-old.

Thacker said the local health department does have a few H1N1 vaccines on hand at the current time, but only a small amount.

The health department is out of the seasonal flu vaccine and Thacker said she does not anticipate that the department will receive anymore.

Although there have been several confirmed cases of the H1N1 flu in the county, no deaths have been reported.

## Livingston awards bid for new water project

Livingston Mayor J.C. Griffin said the city had officially awarded a bid to United Excavating of London for a new water line extension project that will provide water to Wildcat Mountain residents.

Last Thursday the Mayor, and representatives of HMB Engineering, opened ten bids for the project which will supply water to six homes.

The new water line will be laid under the Rockcastle River and will make water available on a three mile stretch on Wildcat Mountain Road.


"Besides the initial six homes, the line will make it possible for any new home owner on Wildcat who builds along Wildcat Mountain Road in Rockcastle to also hook up to city water," Griffin said.

United Excavating bid was \$81,429. Griffin said the city had a state grant of \$225,000 to pay for the project and would use the extra money to run new water lines along Hwy. 490.

The Wildcat Mountain water project is scheduled to start in the next 30 days.

### Peak Colors on the Blue Ridge Parkway

My wife and I have recently returned from our annual vacation; it was our fourth year visiting Chincoteague Island Virginia. As we watched, the Captain of the vessel unloaded basket after basket of live shrimp, crab, oysters, and fish. That night we sat in our favorite booth savoring each bite of the oceanic delights.

When I was but a child, brought-on bath soap such as Dial and Ivory and Irish Spring was a luxury that you got to use in the bathwater on



## The Roots of Rockcastle

This week's history comes from a collection of stories as compiled by Dell Ponder, entitled "The L&N Railroad at Livingston and Surrounding Areas". The following is a collection of memories by Kathleen Quinn-Hunt.

### Old Reliable - A Family Legacy

Railroading was the only way of life for most of the family of Edward and Susan Burton-Quinn, and being a third generation member of that family, it seemed a logical place for me to earn a living. My great-grandparents had a large family with all of them being born in Rockcastle County, except Maggie, who was born in Lincoln County. Emmitt, my grandfather, was born in Livingston before it became an incorporated town. They had Edward #2, Mayme, Maggie, Emmitt, James, Thomas, John, and Daniel. Henry Burton, a brother to Susie Quinn, and Malla Stanley-Burton ran a hotel/rooming house at the end of the old bridge on the opposite corner of the Niceley Hotel. After the death of her husband, my great-grandmother worked in the rooming-house. Henry became the first Town Marshall of Livingston.

Uncle Ed married Annie Hayes, who was the daughter of James Breckinridge and Mary Preston-Hayes in Livingston, and worked there as an engineer for the railroad until the shops and the round-house were closed and moved to Corbin. He was forced to move to Paris, KY, where he could get more work.

Uncle Tom was a fireman on the L&N when there was no automation and everything had to be done by hand. About 1897, he was down in front of the cow-catcher cleaning out the clinkers in the firebox when an engineer named Gray started the train moving, and ran over him. He was interred in Ward Cemetery with

his daughter, Myrtle. His wife, Laura Patterson-Quinn, and child left Livingston about 1905.

Aunt Maggie married William Martin, a railroad agent, and they became the parents of two sons. One of these sons died at a very young age, and was buried in Ward Cemetery. The other son, McCormick, better known as Mack, married Ella Mae Blanford. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Blanford. Mr. Blanford was a railway agent in Livingston. Mack became an agent in Livingston, and lived there with his wife and two daughters, Mildred and Dorthea, until the railroad center was moved. The Blanford's lived in Livingston until their death, and are buried in Elmwood Cemetery at Mt. Vernon. Mack and family moved to Corbin, where he worked until his retirement. He and Ella Mae are buried near Corbin, KY.

Emmitt married Telitha Edna Mullins and they became the parents of three children: Clifford, Robert, and Anna Mae. Anna Mae died in 1913, and is buried in the family plot at Ward Cemetery. For fifty years, Emmitt was a fireman and engineer on the Lebanon Branch. This branch ran between Corbin and Louisville, but occasionally made a run between Louisville and Nashville. Emmitt and Telitha maintained their residence in Livingston until 1940, when she passed away. Being her grandchild, I spent much time with her at the residence, which stands next door to the residence of Vonnie and the late Jerry Mink. In fact, it was in this residence on June 23, 1924, that my mother, Flossie Gustafson-Quinn, gave birth to me.

Memories of railroading fill a large part of my younger life. When Dad, Emmitt, was

### Putting a Stop to Diarrhea

Diarrhea is very common. People frequently get the stomach flu, food poisoning or other illnesses that cause diarrhea.

Most cases are self-limited and not very serious. Their main risks come from dehydration and loss of potassium.

Dehydration is present when a person's body weight drops by 3-5%. When it drops 8-10%, it is very serious and needs intravenous replacement. Using a person's weight is one of the easiest ways to measure the level of dehydration.

The fluid lost with diarrhea can usually be replaced by drinking more fluids. Sports drinks and special formulations for small children help replace both the fluids and electrolytes, but nearly any type of fluid can be consumed--diluted juices, soft drinks or plain water. Milk should be avoided, however, since it is difficult to digest and may prolong the diarrhea.

Medicines can help limit diarrhea. One of the most effective medicines, called loperamide, is available without prescription. This is quite safe to use as long as the diarrhea is not caused by a parasite or invasive bacteria. However, if the diarrhea persists, abdominal pain increases, you have a fever, or if there is blood in the stool you should see your doctor promptly and not take loperamide.

Rarely are prescription medicines used to control diarrhea, and they generally carry greater risks and side effects, including accidental overdoses.

Medicines cannot work well unless a person also uses dietary discretion. At times of diarrhea, it is wise to avoid milk, greasy foods and excessively sweet foods. Foods that are easy to digest are plain rice, potatoes, toast, crackers and bananas.

shooting in 1994-95 and 1995-96, becoming one of the Cardinal's top10 three-point shooters in school history with 148.

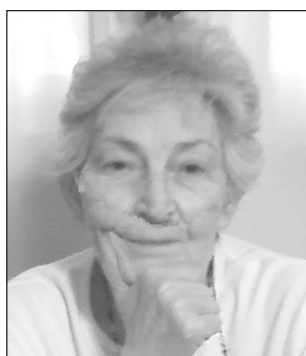

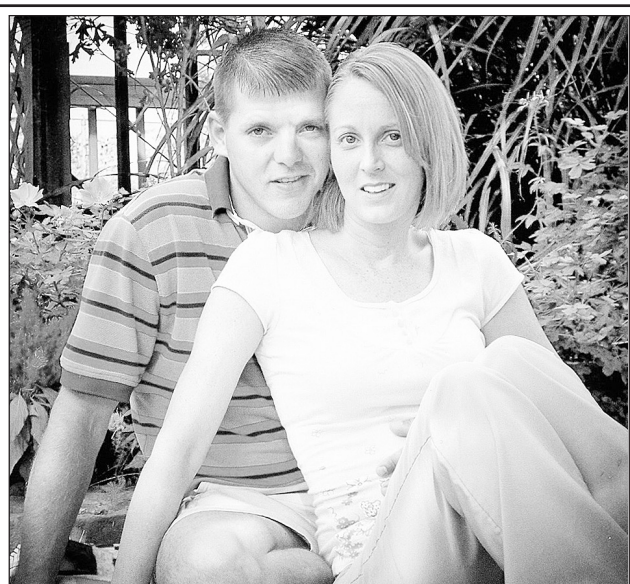

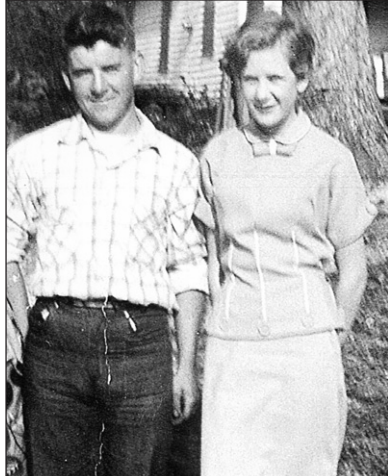

When he's home, Kiser has his own small nation to deal with as he helps Wendy raise their eight children, ranging in age from 12 to five months.

"We really didn't plan to have a big family. We've just been blessed," says Kiser, noting he runs every day to stay in shape and plays one-on-one basketball with 11-year-old son Samuel at their home in rural Oldham County, where all the children are being home schooled.

The spacious house in a tranquil pastoral setting is provided for missionary families by an individual who also lives on the farm.

On a recent balmy fall afternoon, the children laid down their books for a short time to play outdoors and ride bikes along a tree-lined lane on the farm.

Brian says the family has chosen to not have a TV or video games because "there are better things to do."

"Besides," he says, "I would probably veg-out on ESPN, so it's better not to have those temptations in our home."

The sparsely furnished temporary home does include a fridge that's a recent donation from Coach Crum.

Brian gives credit to Wendy for raising the children, all who come across as being polite to the extreme and are blessed with model-like beauty.

of the great plays in Louisville basketball history, draining a three-point shot from the right wing with four seconds left. That shot beat the 15th ranked Bruins 78-76 and gave Coach Crum his first-ever victory on the road over his alma mater.

Through his college career, basketball was once again playing a dominant role in his life, but this time something was different.

Kiser was giving God all the credit and repaying Him through heavy involvement in Athletes in Action and other campus-based community service activities, plus acting as a Christ-centered role model for his teammates.

Summers were spent playing basketball abroad for Athletes in Action and being involved in programs at Southeast Christian Church in Louisville when he wasn't traveling.

Working for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes following graduation from U of L with a business management degree in 1996 and trav-

eling to such places as South Africa furthered Kiser's ambition to minister to others.

"I really started understanding my relationship with God, realizing how my skills on the basketball court could be used to share my faith. I was finally realizing the reason I was created was to get to know my Creator."

He also worked on the home front, using his high profile as a successful U of L basketball player to witness at public schools in the Louisville area.

"Working in the schools was wonderful. I never considered that a job," he says.

The next life-changing experience for Kiser came immediately after the attacks of 9/11/01.

"I started looking at the Muslims, looked on a map to see where Afghanistan was located, and studying what they believed," he says.

In 2004, he and wife Wendy, a former track and field star at U of L, moved with their ever-growing family to Jordan, where Brian spent much of his time studying Arabic in schools there while planning a move to Khartoum, the capital city of

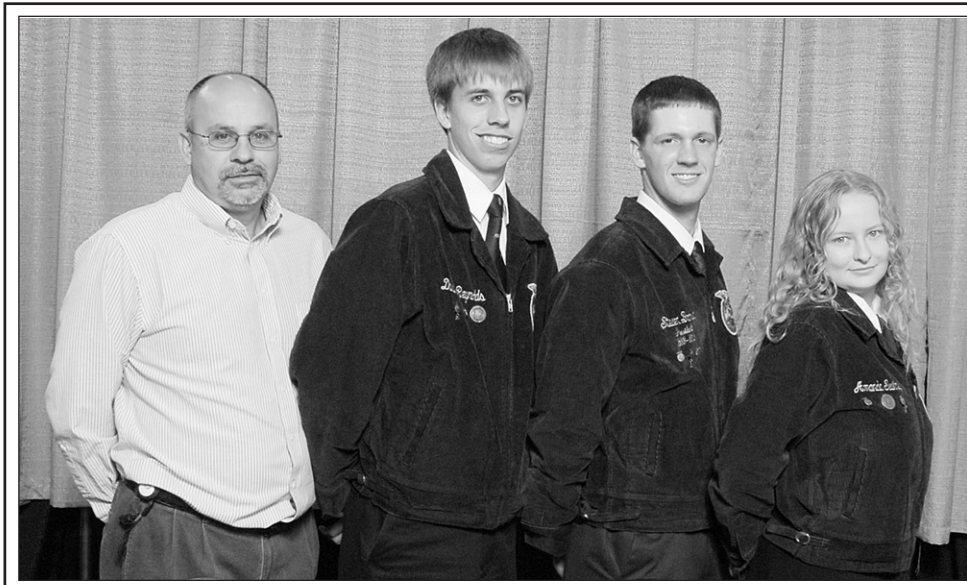

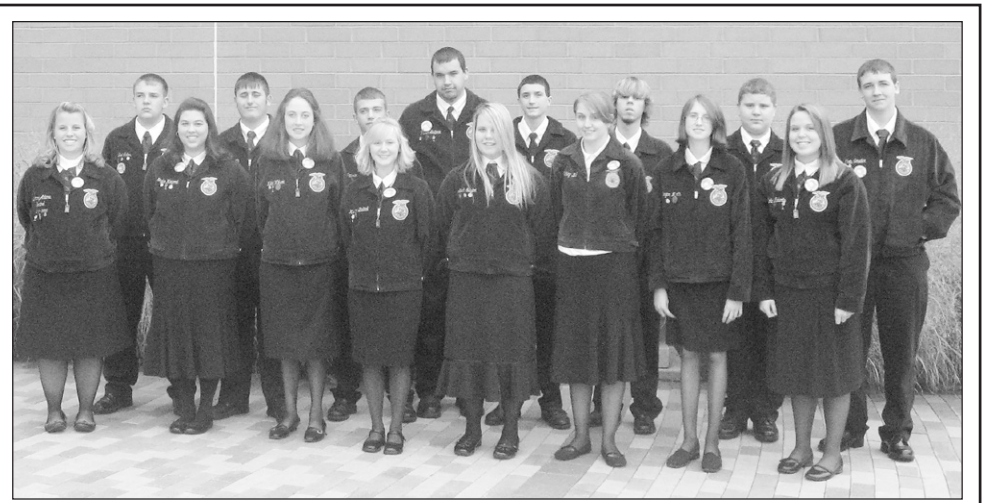

## NOTICE ROCKCASTLE COUNTY SCHOOLS PLAN FOR INCLEMENT WEATHER SCHOOL CLOSINGS EARLY DISMISSAL

Every effort will be made to keep parents and concerned citizens informed as to school closings, early dismissals and possibly a delay plan.

The number one concern is the safety of students. After an extensive evaluation of road conditions in the county, taking into consideration all roads, a decision will be made in regard to closing school.

School closings will be announced on radio stations and four television stations. They are as follows: Radio - WRVK (AM 1460), WVLK (FM 93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WRSL (FM 96.3), WLKT (FM 104.5) WKQQ (FM 100.1) WKDP (99.5). Television - WKYT (Channel 27), WLEX (Channel 18), WTVQ (Channel 36) and WDKY (Channel 56). If possible, the closing will be announced the evening before the closing date. If a determination cannot be made the day prior to the closing date, every possible effort will be made to reach a decision by 6:00 a.m. The announcement will be made no later than 6:30 a.m.



Early dismissal of school due to inclement weather will be announced on the above mentioned radio and television stations. Roads will be closely monitored as school is in session to determine if there is a need for early dismissal. If the need

for early dismissal does occur, parents should make arrangements to meet children as they arrive safely.

Parents and students should not call any radio or television stations to inquire about school closings. This could delay the information distribution to the necessary channel by tying up the phone lines.

There may be a time when a few isolated bus routes may not be made or may be delayed for an hour while the rest of the bus routes will be made on the regular schedule. These bus routes will be announced only on WRVK radio station.

# Rockets lose big to Whitley 42-6

The Rockcastle County Rocket football team lost their sixth game of the season on Friday night when the visiting Whitley County Colonels easily defeated them 42-6, on senior night at the ROCK.

The Colonels scored on their opening drive of the game and never looked back, as the Rockets managed only one score, that in the first half when senior Jamie Todd caught a touchdown pass from senior quarterback Dustin Bishop.

Todd's score pulled the Rockets to within 9 at 15-6. But that would be as close as the Rockets would get to the Colonels.

"Whitley County is one of the top teams we have played all year. They will most likely be playing Highlands in the 5A regional finals again this year and they were certainly ready for us on Friday night," head coach Scott Parkey said.

"They have got a great offense and, when field conditions are as good as they were on Friday night, they are hard to stop," the second year head coach added.

"Their defense was just as good, putting nine to ten men in the box all night long,

which kept us from completing any deep passes or being able to use our play action passes consistently something we have been able to do in other games," he said.

Offensively the Rockets had their lowest total of yards gained so far this season, only 179.

Sophomore Clark Rowe led his team in rushing with 96 yards on 24 carries, junior John L. Saylor had 21 yards on nine carries, Dalton Dillingham got one yard on one carry and Bishop had three yards on four carries.

Bishop was also four for 13 passing for 58 yards. He threw one touchdown pass and he also threw one interception.

Todd had 37 yards on catches from Bishop, Matt Bullens gained 17 yards on one reception and Saylor had four yards, also on one reception.

The Rocket defense gave up 387 yards on Friday night to the visiting Colonels.

Senior Matt Bullens and junior John L. Saylor led the Rocket defense with six tackles and assists each.

Other Rockets with tackles and assists on Friday night were: Corey Baker, 5, Steven Thomason and Dillingham,

four each, Derek Thacker, Cole Abney, B.B. Bradley, Todd and Bishop, all got two each and Nick Thomason, Ben Lake and Rowe, were each credited with one.

The Rockets travel to Morehead on Friday night to take on the Rowan County Vikings in the first round of the play-offs.

The Vikings are 7-3 on the season and defeated Montgomery County, 36-19 last week.

"The Vikings have a great tailback and they run a great option attack. They play an aggressive style of defense, highlighted by good team speed. We will have to be at the top our game on offense, defense and special teams if we are to come away with a win," Coach Parkey said.

"I hope our fans make the 90 minute drive to Morehead. They have got a great facility and it is a great place to watch a game," Parkey said.

Fans traveling to the game should take I-64 to the first Morehead exit, turn left and travel approximately one mile to Rowan County High School, which is located on Viking Lane, on the right.

Game time at Morehead is 7:30 p.m.

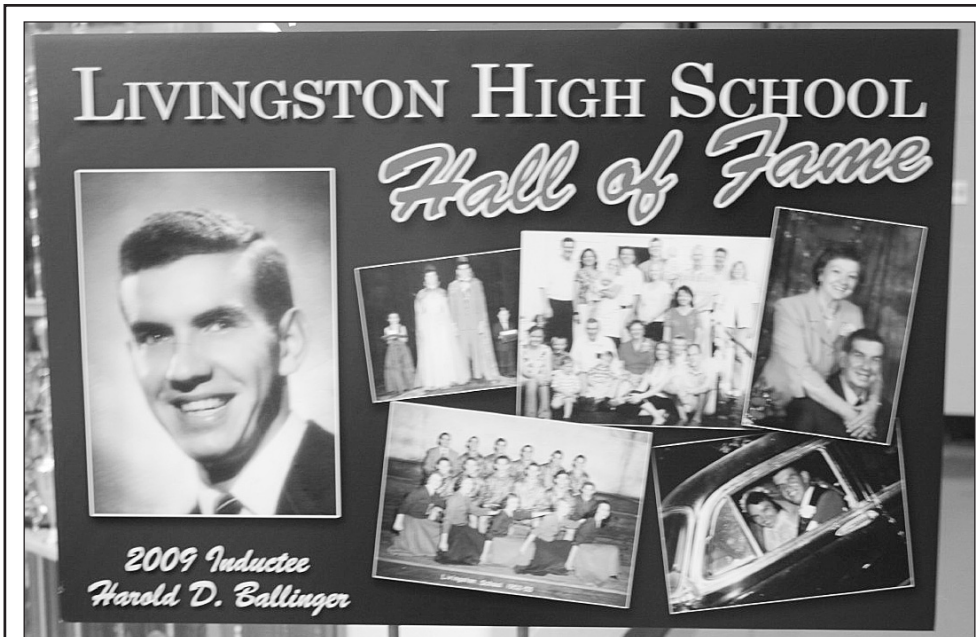

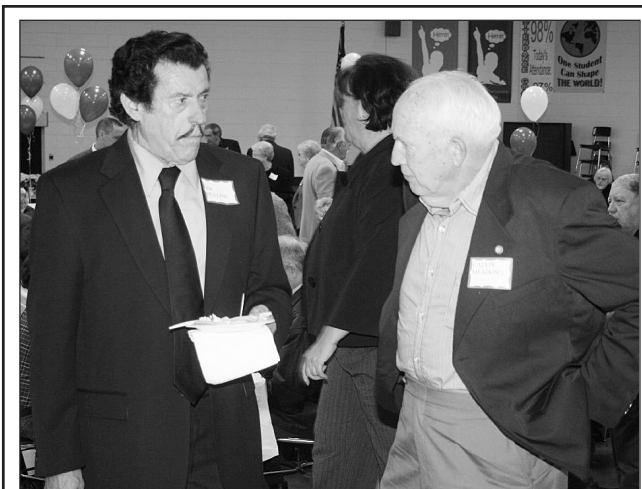

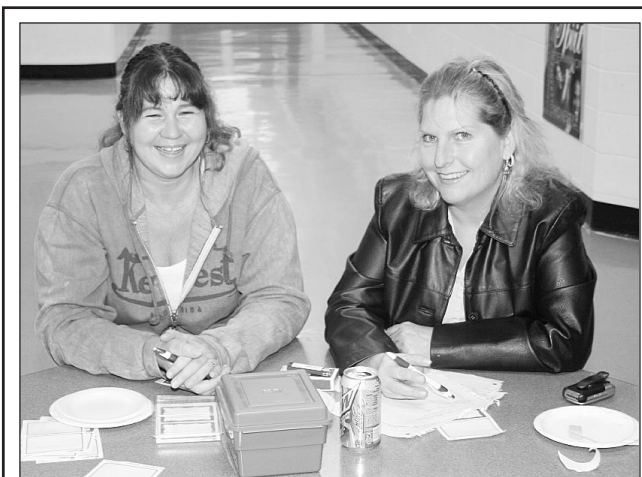

Airmen who complete basic training earn four credits toward an associate in applied science degree through the Community College of the Air Force.

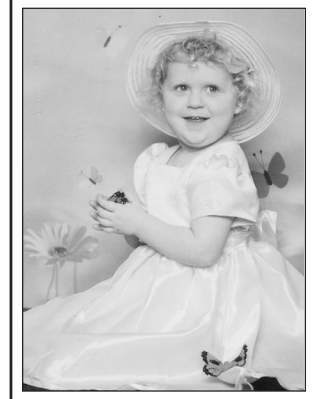

Africa. From Cypress, Bob and Eddie traveled to minister to approximately 175 missionaries. Since they moved back to cleftRock in 1994, the Fields have lived out their vision of discipleship, preventative intervention for couples and families and counseling for missionaries and local folks. A licensed Marriage and Family Therapist, Bob has also operated a private counseling practice, “Roots and Wings” with offices at cleftRock and London. After the murder of three missionaries in Yemen in 2002, at the request of the International Mission Board, the Fields went to counsel the other missionaries serving there.

Their son, Todd, and his wife, Lynnell, served as missionaries in Honduras for 13 years before he was robbed and killed March 28, 2003 while leading a group of high school students on a retreat to Guatemala. Tamira Fields Korn and husband, Joe, served as missionaries for four years in Togo, Africa and have served in Israel for the past 12 years. Valerie Fields Arington, and husband, Jeff, are also involved in ministry. A series of Bible studies Valerie taught in their home in Terrace Park, Ohio led to the plant of Sonrise Community Church, a congregation of approximately 300. The Fields also have seven grandchildren.

“The ministry of cleftRock Retreat Center tells the story of God planting, watering and causing a vision to grow,” Fields said. “It also shows the Body of Christ working together to build and carry out God’s purpose, for His pleasure.”

“cleftRock has become Rockcastle County’s global connection,” he added. “In the last eight years, we have worked with missionaries from 70 countries. As with all visions that come to fruition, the most appropriate response is:

*Now to Him who is able to do immeasurably more than we ask or imagine. According to His power that is at work within us, to Him be glory in the church And in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever. Amen.” (Ephesians 3:20-21)*

to South Florida to obtain painkillers. Detectives utilized informants and other intelligence to determine that a large number of patients showing up in South Florida pain clinics were from Kentucky.

Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Barry Adams and Drug Task Force officer, said this week that some Rockcastle Countians have made the trip to Florida to obtain the prescription drugs and return to the county to sell the drugs for profit or to just use the drugs themselves.

“We trying to cut off the pipeline, but it is a major job,” Adams said after last week’s round-up.

“This type of investigation often involves the same violent criminal activity as any other investigation into organized drug trafficking. We can not forget the dedication and tireless effort put forth by KSP detectives, task force officers and troopers, local officers and federal agents,” emphasized KSP Commissioner Rodney Brewer. “Without them, a round up of this magnitude would not have been possible.”

Photos of those arrested in Rockcastle County in the past two weeks, along with the status of their cases, appear inside this week’s *Signal*.

Each of those arrested were charged with trafficking in controlled substances. Defendants face jail time of 18 months to 20 years.

Police are encouraging anyone with information about drug trafficking to call their toll free hotline. (1-800-DOPE TIP).

## Local input requested for USDA NRCS Farmbill program

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation (NRCS), located at 2019 New Brodhead Road, Mt. Vernon, KY, administers the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), a federal program that provides technical and financial (cost-share) assistance to land users to address natural resource concerns. NRCS is asking for local input for the fiscal year 2010 program.

EQIP is administered in Kentucky using 14 ranking areas across the state. The ranking areas consist of multiple counties that have been determined to have similar farming operations and resource concerns. Applicants within each ranking area compete only with others in that ranking area. NRCS has asked for local input from each of the 14 areas.

A Local Work Group meeting for the ranking area consisting of Bell, Clay, Harlan, Jackson, Knox, Laurel, Rockcastle and Whitley counties is scheduled for November 18th at 9:00 A.M. at the Laurel County Extension Office, located at 200 County Extension Road, London, KY.

The Local Work Group was established by the 2002 Farm Bill as a group to provide recommendations to NRCS on local natural re-

source priorities and criteria for conservation activities and programs. Originally, this group was limited to governmental representatives, however, the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (2008) Farm Bill has now made Local Work Group meetings public meetings and all interested persons are invited to attend.

This is your opportunity to have input regarding the ranking criteria for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program.

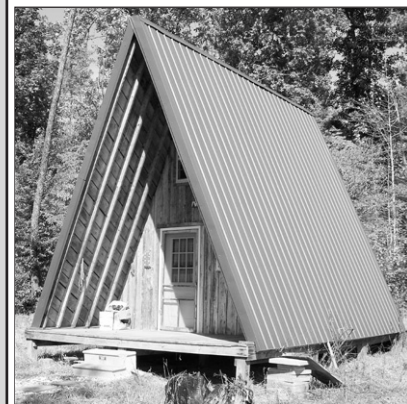

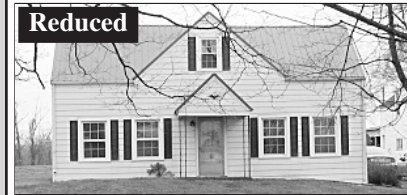
