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# Saturday snowfall causes several wrecks

Only a trace of snow fell on Saturday morning in the county, but it was enough to cause several accidents on I-75, including the above injury accident. According to Kentucky State Police, 44-year-old Barbara Tallent, was hit by the Pontiac G-5 on the right, after she exited a Ford Mustang she was passenger in, which had wrecked moments before the Pontiac went into the median. The Pontiac also hit the Mustang. According to Rockcastle Sheriff Mike Peters there were five wrecks on I-75 between mile markers 62 and 72 in a ten minute period around 8:45 a.m. EMT Jamie McClure is shown stablizing Tallent's neck before she was transported to Rockcastle Regional Hospital and then flown to U.K. Medical Center. Family members said Tallent had multiple injuries, including a broken pelvis, broken leg and bleeding from her kidneys.

# **Reynolds released** on \$150,000 bond

61-year-old James Clayton Reynolds, of Water Tank Hill, Brodhead, who has been charged with kidnapping, resulting in serious physical injury to the victim, burglary in the first degree and assault was released on bond Saturday, after posting a \$150,000 bond.

According to court records, Circuit Judge David Tapp allowed Reynolds to post the high bond in the form of a cashier's check, which is uncommon in felony court cases.

Reynolds has been held in the Rockcastle Detention Center since May 20th, after he was arrested for allegedly beating his estranged wife, 60-year-old Phyllis Reynolds.

According to police, Reynolds was waiting on his wife inside her Willailla home around 4:20 a.m. on May 20, 2009.

Police say that when Phyllis Reynolds returned home from work, Reynolds assaulted her, knocking her semi-unconscious and then tied her to a chair.

Police also allege that Reynolds struck Phyllis Reynolds several times, causing multiple injuries and bleeding and attempted to get her to call her attorney to tell him to drop divorce proceedings.

Police also reported that Reynolds then made his estranged wife take off her clothes so he could wash the blood off her body.

Police say that Phyllis Reynolds eventually escaped from Reynolds, with the help of Deputy Sheriff Stanley Payne, after Reynolds forced her to leave her home, while

# Winter Survival Kit



The snow is here and the roads are getting icier. It is time to put a winter survival kit in the back seat of your car in case you have an accident, get stranded or come across someone who needs help. It should be kept in the back seat if possible, since it can be more difficult or even impossible to get it out of the trunk after an accident.

You could fill your car with things that could be used in an emergency, but selecting a few of the most important items is worthwhile for anyone who will be driving on winter roads.

- Essential items include:
- 1. Dry mittens, gloves, headgear, clothes.
- 2. Flashlights, flares, candles.
- 3. Blankets/sleeping bags.
- 4. Candy bars/non-perishable foods.
- 5. Waterproof matches, knife/hatchet
- 6. 3 pound metal coffee can with cover for melting water.
- 7. Plastic garbage bags (for windbreaks or containers).
- 8. Shovel, sand, rope.
- 9. Road map, compass.
- 10. First aid kit, paper towels, tissues.

Last week my son, Andy, and his family came to the mountain from Philadelphia to celebrate Thanksgiving with Kathy and me, and we had a wonderful time together. The first day we spent the afternoon in the woods, allowing my "city-slicker" grandchildren to experience hiking in the forest, sitting around a roaring fire, and even roasting marshmallows.



That night after a scrumptious meal, Andy and I were cleaning up the kitchen, loading the dishwasher, when one of the children came into the room and asked, "Dad, why are you and Pop doing the dishes?" And yes, he actually meant what is the reason that the MEN were performing this chore.

Andy went on to explain that, when he was a young man, it was his duty to assist with chores in the Griffin household. Then, and in a most emphatic voice, he added, "And we did not have a dishwasher at the time – I had to do them by hand!" My, my, how things have changed.

Later, while recalling Andy's discussion of the chores around the house when he was a boy, I was reminded of the responsibilities I carried when I lived with my mother on our small farm in Rockcastle County. In those days, we heated our home with two coal-wood burning stoves. One was located in the kitchen area. The other in the living room: a large Warm Morning stove with a jacket in that we used to heat the rest of the house.

We pray for gentle snow, like this, or drizzling rain from now until the end of February. We'd love to have just one or two heavy snows to remind of us times past.

But we ask too much, I'm sure

Last Saturday, we had our little Christmas in the Village Festival in Paint Lick and somehow I know for sure that Dean Cornett, buried just 5 years ago, is the angel looking down on all of us and that she had something to do with the snow. Dean always refused to take credit for anything but the bottom line is that the snow was soft and gentle on our village on the day that she set forth for us to celebrate.

I believe in angels. I'm absolutely sure that Dean Cornett is one and that she looks down on those of us who keep her dreams alive. And that she can make it snow when she has too.

In the meantime, I remember the first snows of the year when I was but a lad there on Blair Branch and they were deep and long-lasting. Enough for me to know that there is something to be said and considered about this global warming stuff. Not that I want to get into the argument. But I'm old enough to remember when winters were full of snow and hard freezes that we don't have now. And ice storms never happened.

I remember homemade ice sleighs made from whatever pieces of scrap planks and discarded lumber we might find in the barn or on old house sites and we would craft them into the ultimate down hill sleighs to slide down treacherous slopes that caused us many bruises and sometimes broken bones.

My hero, growing up, was Truman Caudill and he lived way back on the mountain there in the head of Blair Branch and the mining road that went past his house also ran about two miles to the mouth of the holler.

Truman once devised a sleigh that he could, belly down, ride from the top of the mountain, to damn near the mouth of Blair Branch reaching many mile per hour. There were many curves but Truman guided with his feet and by leaning into the many, many curves around the mountain. And he could always get to high, like lightening, speed if a coal truck was not coming the other way.

Truman would encourage anybody to ride his sleigh if they were willing to pull it back to the top of the hill into his front yard and then pull it back when Truman finished a ride.

Most of the time a rider would not make it 100 yards down the hill because the sleigh would be on top of them when they missed a curve.

But one time, I got on the sleigh and took off atop the mountain and the wind was with me. I swear there were G forces as I passed Aunt Lona's place and I wound up in the holler tangled up with a bridge pier.

Truman said, "Your gonna have to build me another sleigh".

Mom said, after cleaning up my bruises, "No more hanging out with Truman Caudill.

Thank God, she didn't mean it.



There has been a situation recently brought to my attention that not only was surprising, but has angered me, as well. I have chosen to address it this week in my column instead of the usual Roots of Rockcastle. That column will reappear in next week's Mount Vernon Signal.

My husband, Stanley, and I have joined an animal rescue here in the county this past fall, RAIN: Rockcastle's Animals In Need. Prior to that, we wouldn't have had any idea of the helpless plight of our local animals, as well as those on a national level. Only this week, we've joined the national Humane Society, as well. These poor helpless and defenseless animals who have no voice to ask for help must rely on a few already tired, overwhelmed, overstressed, and economically burdened individuals to step forward who will say, "Yes, I'll take a few minutes or hours of my day, and share a meager portion of my income to help you to have a better quality of life; to be given a second chance to live; or maybe to be loved perhaps for the first time". We've never been more pleased to be affiliated with such an organization.

After all that we as a group have done, there is still so much we have yet to accomplish. It will take years to see any real fruit of our labors through community support, which I hope will increase, affordable spay and neuter programs and education. I think part of the problem is people like Stanley and I being totally ignorant to the problem. This county is full of strays, part of which were "drop-offs" (which is illegal), animals being starved, neglected and abused in manners I dare not even mention here. The animal shelter. which RAIN is not affiliated with, is not the answer. Even under the best of conditions, shelters are an animal "hell". The animals which don't find homes within a very, very, limited period must endure this trauma only to die in the

at all.

When I heard this, as well as some of the other horror stories, I was so shocked. It leaves me asking the reason why. The sad story of the black dogs made me recall a poem I read several years ago, about a poet who undoubtedly owned a little black dog. It is as follows:

> The Little Black Dog By Elizabeth Gardner *Reynolds*

Deadline Nears for Livestock Disaster Relief

Kentucky USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA), is reminding eligible ranchers and livestock producers of the December 10, 2009, deadline for applying for benefits under the provisions of the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) for losses incurred during calendar year 2008.

The program provides payments to eligible livestock producers that have suffered livestock grazing losses due to drought or fire. Fire losses apply only to federally managed rangeland.

Eligible Kentucky counties for the 2008 calendar year are: Adair, Bell, Casey, Clinton, Cumberland, Harlan, Knox, Laurel, Lincoln, McCreary, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Russell, Wayne and Whitley. Currently no counties are eligible for 2009.

Eligible livestock under the program include beef cattle, alpacas, buffalo, beefalo, dairy cattle, deer, elk, emus, horses, goats, llamas, poultry, reindeer, sheep and swine. For losses due to drought, qualifying drought ratings are determined using the U.S. Drought Monitor, at



Senior Jackie Alexander led her team in scoring with 26, while junior Sara Hammond led the team in rebounding and scored 19 points.


Junior Angie Lawrence had 10, followed by junior Shanlee Burton with 4. Junior Ella McQueary scored 2 as did junior Kristen Abney.

"We've got to work harder to get better defensively and cut down on some silly turnovers, but we are making progress," Noble said.


Saturday, the Lady Rockets traveled to Nelson County, where they took on Green County.

development was a subdivision. Then it was decided that none of the criteria for the county taking over maintenance of the roads had been met.

There are only five occupied dwellings on the 11 lots on Shady Lane and onlysix on the 13 lots on Jonance. In addition, the road is not blacktopped.

The discussion brought up the matter of the county's need for a more detailed ordinance order as to the requirements for a subdivision being developed in the county.

Lambert Road came under discussion again when the court was told by County Judge/Executive that the court needed to approve a Memorandum of Agreement with the state for the \$174,891 available for resurfacing roads in the county.

The state had listed, by condition of the road and number of houses, the three priorities for the improvement -- Lambert Road, 2.56 miles; Lower River Road (off Sand Springs Road), 1.37 miles and Copper Creek Road, 7/10ths of a mile.

The question of whether or not to work on Lambert Road was discussed and the common consensus of the court seemed to be that since the road has "terrible drainage" that it would be a waste of the money to put new blacktop down that "would last maybe a year."

Several attempts have been made to get the necessary easements from the 51 property owners on the road so that the road can be widened where needed and

ditched. However, while the majority of the property owners have said they want the county to work on the road, only 18 of the 51 property owners have signed easements.

"When we get ready to spend this money, the fiscal court must decide where it will be expended," County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis said during the meeting.

Also during the meeting, the county approved a renewal of the Memorandumof-Agreement with the Prosecutorial Advisory Council to extend the "Rocket Docket" program for another year.

Asst. Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley told the court that he considered the pilot program a success during the past year. Bartley said that 56 cases had been processed through the program and the average number of days the 56 defendants had spent the county jail -- "on the county's dime"-- was 16, as opposed to an average of 167 before implementing the program. This translates to a savings of over \$200,000 to the county by enabling the detention center to hold more state prisoners than county prisoners, thereby increasing their revenue.

In other business, the court approved taking over maintenance of Arrowhead Drive for a distance of 508 feet. The road, also known as the Roger Parsons' road, has four occupied dwellings on it.

Approved payment of \$4,612.25 to Carpenter Custom Bulldozing for the reconstruction of Wolf Creek Road. Carloftis told the court that the cost of reconstructing the road, which was washed out by heavy rains, would be around \$49,000, not including labor and equipment provided by the county. The state had estimated that it would cost \$104,000 to repair the road and has sent the county a check for \$83,000 for 80% of the cost. However, even though the county managed to get the road rebuilt for much less, the court is not certain if they will still have to pay 20% of the cost and return the difference to the state.

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
