May storm clean-up bill surpasses **\$300K** mark

At an end-of-the fiscal year special meeting last Wednesday, the fiscal court approved payment of another round of bills from contractors for clean-up related to the May storms.

Last Wednesday's bills approved totaled \$104,232 and were made to four contractors with Clifford Collins' bill being the largest at \$61,429.32. On question by Magistrate Jan Stevens, Carloftis said that the clean-ups have to be checked by FEMA inspectors to make sure the work is done properly before payment is made. To date, the county has received bills for \$257,114. These bills do not include payments for gravel, \$70,000 alone in one month, and the work of county employees on the clean-ups. At some point, the county will receive reimbursement from FEMA for all but 12% of the funds paid out.

The payments due contractors necessitated a transfer from the general to

the road fund of \$100,000. "Without the occupational tax money we would have had to borrow money for the clean-up," Carloftis said. He also added that without the occupational tax, there would not have been any blacktop laid in the county this year because the county would not have been able to borrow the \$2,000,000 that was spent on blacktop.

In a related issue, Hal Holbrook, CSEPP director for the county, told the court that 122 individuals signed up with FEMA for damage from the May storms and \$257,371.60 was paid out in the county for claims.

Also during the meeting, the court made two changes to the county's administrative code.

One involves a change to the safety section of the code, calling for random drug testing of employees. Magistrate Bill McKinney approved of the change, saying it needed to be there to help prevent accidents by county workers.

The other change will shorten the probation period for new workers from three months to 60 days.

During the meeting, the court was presented with a check for \$14,005 in excess fees from the Sheriff's Department, along with the 2009 property tax settlement. The settlement will have to be audited. It was also noted during the meeting that only approximately \$125,000 in property taxes was not collected out of \$2,803,847 billed.

The final budget of \$5,680,731 for all funds for 2010-11 was presented to the court.

"Cashbox offers a huge advantage for aspiring artists. I consider it a privilege to be able to sign with such a quality record company at a young age,"


Davis said.

Rockcastle Memories

Teenage "Hangouts" One of my faithful readers has suggested that I take a nostalgic look at the places in and around Mt. Vernon where teenagers used to "hang out" in the late '50's and '60's. I decided to include the sites where we took our dates and the niches where the guys gathered after we took our dates home at night. We had several favorite locations for

When dating, it was necessary to find restaurants that had not only jukeboxes but food that was suitable for our appetites - usually Cokes, hamburgers, and french fries. As I have mentioned before, we usually found ourselves gathered at the Dinner Bell Restaurant, at Kelsey's Café, or at Hamm's Drive-In on old US 150 between Mt. Vernon and Brodhead. All of these places had the necessary Rock and Roll tunes playing in the background.

If taking our dates to the Vernon Theater, we found a suitable parking spot on Main Street and walked to Kelsey's for a snack before the movie. The Café had several booths that we filled, and it was known for great burgers and fries to satisfy our growing bodies. Usually, we doubled dated and often used Kelsey's as a meeting place for the two couples before heading to the movie. The booths were located in the front room with the jukebox; most of the older folks ate dinner in the back room, where it was significantly quieter.

If we were going to the Valley Drive-In Theater, we usually met at the Dinner Bell Restaurant on Richmond Street in front of Cox Funeral Home. This gathering spot had more room and offered us a more extensive menu. I can remember trying to get a table next to the large picture window so we could watch the teenagers who were currently "making the circle" from the high school to the cemetery in their "hot mobiles.

I distinctly recall Bobby Fain, "Hammer" Burton, Charles Hensley, and several of the older teens "cruising" in their classic Chevrolets. Of course, most of them usually had a cute girl sitting by their side - or they had an entire carload of girls riding with

Sometimes, if we had a 'special" date whom we wanted to impress, we took them to the Lodge at Renfro Valley or to the classiest place in our territory - Boone Tavern in Berea. If you took a date to either of these places, the girl would be electrified for sure. That only happened to me on a very rare occasion, but it was worth the cost and the effort. I never met a girl who was not totally impressed by having dinner at the Boone Tavern. I think that it made the girls feel grown up and sophisticated.

Now let me tell you about the places the guys congregated after we took our dates home. The most likely place was probably the Standard Oil

station owned by Bradley Baker behind the courthouse. There were several reasons why we gathered there: it was one of the few places open after midnight, it was close to town, and most of the time some of our friends were either working the late shift or they would be hanging around waiting for us to assemble.

Bradley always had Cokes that were ice-cold and the appropriate snacks for constantly hungry young fellows. But one of the best things was that we could cash checks if we really needed funds. Some of us actually had charge accounts so we that could purchase gasoline until we came up with the cash.

Even though the Dinner Bell Restaurant was closed after hours, there were still some occasions when you could find us there, sitting on the hoods of our cars and watching the pretty constant stream of teens passing down Richmond Street looking for something to "get into." I remember one of those old, red Coke machines at the Dinner Bell, and we spent our dimes pulling bottles from the machine that were laying on their sides waiting for our coins.

One night someone asked if anyone in our car had a cup. After searching, one of the guys came up with a few paper cups. At this point, the guy started opening the Cokes that were still in the machine with a bottle opener, allowing the cold liquid to pour into the cups. We all got a laugh out of this escapade. Needless to say, it wasn't long until that machine was replaced with one in which the bottles were sitting upright and had to be pulled through a maze to reach the spot where they could be removed.

I remember one night several of the guys decided to gather at the water works lake on old Brodhead road. One by one we pulled into the small gravel parking lot. We all tuned our radios to WLS in

Despite being surrounded by her new extended family in Mt. Eden, Linda Henson still gets lonely from time to

For 20 years, she and husband Jim were a truck-driving team whose travels took them to nearly every state and throughout Canada.

Their nomadic life on the road together came to a halt last October when they purchased what was originally the Mt. Eden Ruritan Club

It was the fulfillment of a long-time goal for the couple who reside on Murphy's Lane in Spencer County.

'We had talked for years about how we'd like to have this place, and what we'd do with it," says the 61-year-old Illinois native.

After purchasing the white, concrete-block structure on the Spencer-Shelby line, the pair took "a week off the truck" and began refurbishing the building to accommodate a restaurant/grocery/recreation hall.

Most recently called "Fat Boys," it was operated for years as "Pappy's Place" and known for serving up delicious hot dogs, according to some of the locals.

Due to having two pool tables just inside the front door, it is often called "the pool hall," according to Linda, who says her plan is for the exterior to look like a gingerbread house.

The new name is "Silver Dollar Café" in honor of a similar business by the same name owned by Linda's sonin-law in Farmersville, Ill.

Ironically, Jim, 57, helped build the structure in 1970-71 while working as a fuel attendant at the Waddy Truck Stop.

Both are into their second marriage, and met when Jim, who began operating trucks in 1985, was assigned to evaluate her driving skills.

Jim is still driving Peterbilt, and Linda is suffering from withdrawal after spending 18 years on the road with him.

"I've gotten close to all my customers, and they're like an extension of the family, but I got really depressed about a month ago because I miss being with Jim," she says.

Weekends are about their only time together, due to his schedule that calls for stops at all 43 Wal-Marts in West Virginia Monday through Friday. He also calls on four Wal-Mart stores in Kentucky, and one each in Virginia and Maryland, picking up old produce for transport to hog

Saying she "doesn't know how to be a housewife," Linda's days are taken by the increasingly busy restaurant which is open 7 a.m. until 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. Jim usually joins her in operating the business from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, and 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. Sunday.

Also providing help are three employees: Tricia McKinney, Debbie Walters, and Elizabeth Nation.

Noting that "nearly everything is made from scratch," the Silver Dollar Café serves up daily \$5 specials (Tuesday is meatloaf day), and a wide array of sandwiches and desserts.

In addition to being attracted by the home-cooked food, regular patrons usually have a hot rook or checker game going.

When the games get a bit too heated, or the conversation too loud, Linda has been known to post the names of offenders on the wall behind the tables.

Sometimes the sign simply says "No cheating."

"We treat everybody who comes in here just like family, because that's what they are. You won't find too many who aren't related one way or another," she says.

During their first Christmas in the building, the couple discovered it was the



Of this amount, estimated receipts in the general fund are \$2,191,879, which includes \$1,310,000 from occupational tax fees, \$420,000 from the insurance tax and \$270,000 from the county share of property taxes. The total amount of the estimated revenues was lowered by \$704,122 because of cash transfers out to other funds -- primarily to the road and jail funds.

The largest appropriation from the general fund is for \$1,319,435 for general government, which includes salaries, program support for the Sheriff, county clerk, PVA office and economic develop-

ment; \$252,365 for repayment of borrowed funds; \$139,500 for fringe benefits - employers share and \$136,300 for fire departments' utilities, rescue squad, emergency management, ambulance service, etc.

Estimated revenues for this fiscal year in the road fund is \$1,447,410 - up \$365,000 from last fiscal year.

The total includes anticipated transfers from the general fund of \$349,910, \$856,000 from the county road aid fund and \$172,000 from truck license fee distribution.

Appropriations from the road fund include \$790,200 for road maintenance and repair, \$196,610 for employers share of fringe benefits and \$251,550 for leases - re-

payment of borrowed funds.

Estimated budgeted receipts in the jail fund of \$1,178,162, includes \$650,000 for housing state prisoners, \$65,100 for housing county prisoners and \$354,212 estimated transfers in from the general fund.

The biggest appropriation from the jail fund includes \$873,862 for payroll, food, medical, etc., over \$100,000 for loan payments and \$173,800 for employee benefits.

Other appropriations included in the budget are: \$185,500 for the Local Government Economic Assistance Fund; \$313,100 for the 911 Fund and \$341,230 for the CSEPP fund.

The county's presently has \$12,304,587 in outstanding debt (principal and interest), including a principal balance of \$2,538,517 still owed on the SourceCorps building (being paid for with lease payments from SourceCorps); \$2,430,000 for work at the industrial park and \$1,925,322 of the \$2,000,000 borrowed last year for road surfacing in the county.

There is still \$480,000 owed on the courthouse annex, but the bulk of this payment is made by the state through the Administrative Office of the Court. There is still \$1,148,000 owed on the detention center but the court plans to look into refinancing this debt at a lower interest rate.

The first regular meeting of the fiscal court for the 2010-11 fiscal year will be next Tuesday, July 13th.





The Family Room By: Dr. Roy Don Whitehead

"After an abusive marriage, I promised myself that would never happen again, but it is!" Diane said in amazement. (All characters are fictitious.) "The last two men I've dated have both been abusive. They all seem so nice at first. How can I tell which ones are abusers?"

Over the last sixteen years as a counselor at Bethany House Abuse Shelter in Somerset, I have been asked that question many times. Victims sometimes find themselves getting out of one abusive relationship and into another. Even very intelligent people may not know or may not see the warning signs that could alert them to the presence of an abuser.

Warning Sign #1 is jealousy. It may seem like love when he is very possessive and wants to know everything you did during the day. He may threaten another male who has talked to you or he may act hurt when you talk to your boss on the phone. That is not love; it is jealousy and it can lead to misery in an abusive relationship. What seems so "sweet" at first becomes all-encompassing as he monitors your every move and threatens to kill you if you leave.

Warning Sign #2 is his wanting to spend every moment with you. As the relationship progresses, you realize that he is so insecure that he cannot stand to be separated from you. He is afraid you will leave him if he lets you out of his sight. As with jealousy, this quickly becomes old, as you have no privacy and no life of your own.

Warning Sign #3 is his rushing the relationship along. He wants you to move in together after a month of dating or he wants to marry you after two months. Part of you is flattered by this kind of intensity and mistakes it for love. Another part of you realizes you need more time to get to know each other. Abusers seem to worry that they cannot maintain the "nice guy" facade for long so they must move quickly. Marrying him or moving in with him increases his control over you.

Warning Sign #4 is his temper. One victim told me that he never was angry at her (until they were married), but she had seen him beat the dashboard in anger at other drivers and challenge someone to a fight over a trivial incident. His temper may turn on you once you reside inside his house.

Warning Sign #5 is his attempt to control you. "I like you better with short hair," he says, and you get your hair cut. "Don't wear any makeup," he says, "you look pretty without it." Or he may say, "Don't you think that dress is a little too short?" What begins as a subtle suggestion escalates into fullfledged control, as he tells you what to wear, how to cut your hair, where to go and whether or not you can get a job.

Warning Sign #6 is his isolating you from other people. "I want it to be just us," he says, "so let's don't take your kids." He may discourage you from having friends or visiting your family. As the relationship intensifies, he will throw a fit or a lamp if you visit your mother, or he will cuss you for having lunch with a girlfriend. The control comes slowly, but it comes.

Warning Sign #7 is that, while you are madly in love, everybody else thinks he is bad for you. Other people can often see the abuse/control before you can. Listen carefully to what family and friends tell you. Do not accept their advice uncritically, but, if they are nearly unanimous in their disapproval, they probably see something that you do not. If they are not telling you anything, ask them for an opinion. Friends and family will sometimes say nothing because they do not want to say something negative about him. It is better to hear the negative before the wedding than six months after when the abuse has already begun.

What is CSEPP?

In 1985, Congress directed the Army to destroy its entire stockpile of chemical weapons in the safest manner possible. Many of these weapons are forty years old or older and were built to deter other countries from using chemical weapons of their own against the United States. While the risk of an accident/incident involving the stored chemical is very small, the increasing age of the weapons increases the risk.

The Chemical Stockpile Emergency Preparedness Program (CSEPP) is an outstanding example of partnership among the Department of the Army, Department of Homeland Security, States, Tribal Nations and local jurisdictions. The common goal among these governmental agencies is to develop and enhance the emergency preparedness capabilities in the unlikely event of a chemical accident/incident at the Blue Grass Army Depot.

Ten states, forty-one counties, and one Tribal Nation surrounding the eight U.S. Army stockpile sites participate in CSEPP. The eight states hosting installations with chemical stockpiles are: Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Indiana, Kentucky, Oregon, Utah and Maryland (stockpile eliminated; site closed) Two additional states, Illinois and Washington, also participate in the program because of their borders' proximity to the stockpiles in Indiana and Oregon, respectively. The Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Reservation in Oregon also actively participate in the program. Thirteen counties are in the Immediate Response Zones the areas closest to where the chemical agents are stored and generally within approximately a ten-mile radius. Twenty-five counties are in Protective Action Zones, beginning at the outer edge of the Immediate Response Zones and extending to a distance of between six and thirty-one miles. The remaining three counties are designated as host counties, which lie outside the Immediate Response Zones and Protective Action Zones.

In Kentucky, Madison County is classified as an Immediate Response Zone (IRZ), Rockcastle, Clark, Estill, Garrard, Jackson and Powell are classified as Protective Action Zones (PAZ), and Fayette, Jessamine and Laurel are classified as Host counties.

CSEPP is administered through the states. Funds are distributed to the states under Cooperative Agreements, based upon a negotiated work plan between the states and Department of Homeland Security Regional Offices. Under the agreements, each state identifies needs, develops proposed projects to meet those needs, requests funds, and disburses those funds at the state level and to local governments. CSEPP focuses on providing the personnel, equipment, and training necessary to establish a response infrastructure that enables emergency managers to quickly alert the public, manage the response, and communicate with the public, the media, and emergency responders. Equally important is public awareness of what to do in the event of an accident/incident.

Since the beginning of the program, CSEPP communities have made significant progress; our communities are included among those best prepared in the nation.

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

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


