Concern is being voiced by the owners of Climax Spring Water and King Bottling Company, an operation with a strong local business presence.

The company, owned by former Mt. Vernon Mayor Karen King, says the proposal includes the use of a herbicide to kill certain trees. But, she says the herbicide has proven to pose a danger to the quality of ground water.

While their company has the resources within their plant to treat the water so that it is safe to drink, King says her concerns lie in the fact that a number of local citizens still get water directly from the spring. "The water taken directly from the spring is not treated, and it is proven that herbicide can pose a serious danger to ground water quality," King said.

speaks to the effects of the herbicide, labeled TCP, that will be used.

The report says "TCP is both mobile and persistent. Pesticides with similar properties have been found in ground water. Due to environmental fate characteristics of tricolopyr acid, the Agency believes the chemical has a potential to leach to ground water."

King went on to say that, "This proposal will not impact our business, but we do feel a responsibility to try to protect our neighbors who use the spring and do not have the resources to treat it."

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court has approved the purchase of .61 acres that will allow them to undertake what they call a much-needed expansion of the Road Department.

The unanimous decision came at a special called meeting last Friday.

The acreage adjoins the property where the county garage now sits on U.S. 25 South. The Fiscal Court agreed to pay \$24,500 for the land. Magistrate Bill McKinney, who chairs the Infrastructure Committee, said the price was substantially less than was asked for the property the last time the Court inquired and something they couldn't pass up.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis said that the Road Department currently doesn't have enough room and is very crowded. "This will give us the opportunity to expand the way we've needed to for some time now," Carloftis said.

Chamber approves hosting Mt. Vernon Mayoral debate

The Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce voted on Tuesday to put on a Mount Vernon Mayoral Debate in advance of the November 2nd primary election. The Chamber intends to extend invitations to sitting Mayor Gary Cromer and challengers Dr. Mike Bryant, Sr., and Councilman Don Jones "in the next few days," according to Chamber president Arielle Reese.

Athletes come from all over for hospital event

The first-ever Rockcastle Regional Hospital Run, Hike or Bike attracted 165 participants from throughout Kentucky and some from out of state.

The unique event, held Saturday morning at the Lake Linville Recreational Area, featured multiple sports that participants could choose from, including a 5K run, a 2mile walk, a duathlon and bike tour.

The turnout for the event, which was designed to promote fitness and the local community, far exceeded estimates of organizers. "We were pleasantly surprised," said Dwain Harris of Rockcastle Regional. "We're very grateful to the community and all of the volunteers, sponsors and participants for embracing the idea and making it a safe, positive experience."

The 5K Run by the Lake attracted the most participants at 71. Local runner Justin Poynter took first place overall with a time of 17:42, while Josh Haynes of Burnside finished second and Brandan Simpson of Crab Orchard came in third. In the women's division, Melissa Ramsey of Alpha, Kentucky, won first place with a time of 22:58, while Debbie Biddle of Cynthiana came in second and Lori Wilson of Winchester finished third.

Forty athletes competed in the duathlon, which consisted of a 5K run followed by a 16.5 mile bike ride from Lake Linville to Brodhead, then onto Chesnut Grove Rd, Hwy. 1505, Hurricane School Road, and finally Renfro Creek Road back down to the lake.

Lewis Jackson of Lexington finished first with a time of 1:10:06, followed by Ryan New of Danville and Kevin Black of London. The first female finisher was Lisa Bowman of Williamsburg with a time of 1:25:58. Willis Coffey was the first Rockcastle County resident to cross the finish line with a time of 1:27:55.

Property Valuation Administrator Margaret Offut's office will still be closed.



Lamero, Rockastle's Southern Community When one thinks of southern Rockcastle County, Livingston comes to mind, but even farther south than Livingston lies the little community of Lamero. This week, the Roots of Rockcastle series takes a tour of Lamero through the memories of Charlie Sturgill. Lamero, at one time, was a thriving and populous small community. Now that it is "off the beaten path", it is being forgotten as are many other small communities all over the county. It is located on Highway 490, which at one time was the old Dixie Highway, near the Laurel County line.

Charlie Sturgill was born in 1928, just across the county line, in Laurel county but spent much of his time in Lamero, and lived near what was known as "Mahaffey Hollow". This hollow has been known by other names, as well, according to Charlie. He is the son of Bill and Della Rader-Sturgill. His mother grew up on Brush Creek.

When Charlie grew up, he remembered Lamero being "full of people all the way to Climax". The people, mostly Robinsons and Gilliams, were farmers who raised crops of



vegetables and tobacco. In the 1930s and 1940s, life was hard in Lamero. There were "no cars and no money". People travelled by horse for the most part, and a trip to town, either Livingston or Mount Vernon, was a "haveto case". Many left Lamero to find a better living in the north.

Meanwhile, life went on in Lamero. There was a store run by Claude Gilliam, and a post office. Charlie wasn't for sure if they occupied the same location or not. He said, in later years, Elsie Gilliam-Jones came to own the store.

Near the store and post office was the Pleasant Run Church and school. This is where Charlie received his education. There was also a cemetery near the store and church.

Charlie was fortunate enough to find work locally. He worked for the L&N Railroad as a bridge carpenter for thirty-nine years. There was no depot at Lamero. The closest depot was either at Livingston or at Hazel Patch, over in Laurel County. He also served during the Korean War, overseas. Charlie remembers Lamero with fond-

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
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I pretty much grew up on dried apples. From late August until this time of year, Mom would patiently peel and thinly slice a variety that we called "horse apples" because it was a variety that Pap had lost the name but the draft horses on the place and the mules and cows loved to munch. Mom only knew for sure that he had ordered the trees from Stark' s brothers and that it was a brought on variety.

The nags and cows on our old place, there in the head of Blair Branch, loved to eat them because they were ultrafirm and juicy and crunched up pleasantly in the mouth when eaten fresh there off the trees in Pap's old orchard. They were about the size and shape of a pregnant baseball l and sort of yellow green. Non-descript and not that tasty by my standards, but they were full of sugar. And they would dry from juice to leather on a sheet of tin roofing in hot sun in just a day.

And so we peeled and dried them by the bushels and they shrunk to nearly nothing before Mom stashed them away in feed sacks there in the pantry or behind the woodfired cook stove there ii the kitchen. Apple chips that would swell up in your stomach and give you the ultimate belly ache if you ate more than a few. Ultimate constipation.

But Mom had recipes galore that involved nutmeg, cinnamon, allspice, ginger, molasses, spice bark, sassafras, and so forth and once or twice a week throughout the winter, breakfast would consist of fried apple pies instead of fried bacon and gravy and biscuits and fresh hen eggs. She would soak the dried apples overnight in some thrown-together mixture of sweetening and spices. Then

she would roll out biscuit dough, there on a floured end of the big kitchen table, so thin that you could see through it.

She would take a soup bowl turned upside down and quickly strip off big circles of dough contained inside the bowl, over and over again. And then she would fill the middle of the dough with whatever nectar she had soaked over night and combined with dried horse apples. She would fold the circle of dough into a half moon and crimp the edges of the fold with a table fork And then

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



Postage Stamps Remembered

A stack of 45-RPM records, a batch of Mad Magazines, bubble gum baseball cards, or a few postage stamps can bring back memories of the 50's decade. Stamps are a reflection of the changes that have swept the country since it cost only 3 cents to mail a letter in 1950. The 3-cent stamp had been in effect since 1932. Post cards cost only 2 cents at that time. The little blue 3-cent stamp carried a bust image of Thomas Jefferson. A new blue stamp showing the Statue of Liberty came out in 1954. The rate to mail a letter changed

Diana, who seemingly knows half the county through her long-time employment in an admissions office of Lake Cumberland Medical Center, has provided in 1958 when the cost of a stamp was increased to 4 cents with Abraham Lincoln's photo on a maroon stamp.

I became interested in collecting postage stamps in the early 60's when my grandmother (Mommie Katie) showed me a trunk she had in her attic filled with letters that she had collected since she was a very young woman. Because I had no knowledge of the value of stamps, I purchased a book that gave the estimated value of older stamps. With Mommie Katie's help, she and I carefully removed the envelopes from many of the letters showing the date that the stamp was used for mailing the cards and letters. I solicited help from my brother Al to look up the value of the stamps that I had been given.

I recall Al and me sitting at his kitchen table while he was living in Georgetown and looking up the value of the stamps that had been given to me. At the time, Al was pastor of a rural church in Scott County. We had no idea how long it would take us to figure just how valuable some of the stamps were until we learned how to determine the exact date of the stamps. We quickly learned that the number of perforations along the sides of the stamps had something to do with their value. Perforations are the rows of holes between stamps on a sheet, booklet, or roll. The book I had purchased came with a perforation gauge allowing us to correctly identify the dates of the stamps.

I can vividly remember finding one of the stamps in the book and its value was estimated to be approximately \$90. We both were shocked and became even more interested in determining the value


Gilbert Bullock

Like when my nephew Terry Joe White visited us in Lexington during a period Carol's sister, Charlotte,was living with us on the UK campus. We had left Terry, who was about 12 or 13 at the time, alone in the apartment while we were out for a short time.

Charlotte was anticipating a phone call from a foreign student who had recently become a great admirer of hers.

Upon our return, she asked Terry if there had been any phone calls. "Just somebody trying to

find a car lot," he replied.

I've enjoyed calling her "Char-lot" ever since.

It was during that same visit that Terry, who has always had a fondness for ice cream, called his mom, Hadie, back in Somerset to tell her that Uncle Don and Aunt Carol had taken him to an ice cream shop that had 31 flavors (his first visit to a Baskin-Robbins).

of the entire collection that I had been given.

I remember a Friday night when we were trying to estimate the value of my stamps. The rest of our family had gone to bed, and Al and I spent most of the entire night looking up different stamps. The harder we worked, the greater the value of my collection became. Over and over we exclaimed, "Look at this one! It is more valuable than any we have looked up so far!"

Most of Mommie Katie's stamps were from before WWII and many actually were sent during the war. She had saved letters from family members and friends throughout the early years of her life. Many of these older stamps had the greatest value. Some of them were from relatives who served over seas during the war. I can remember tears filling Mommie Katie's eyes as she carefully retrieved some of the old letters and began reading their contents.

When Al and I finished with our estimation, we came to the realization that this small collection had a very high value. We surveyed ap-

proximately 75 stamps, and the combined value of them amounted to more than \$1,000. I was shocked beyond belief and so was my brother.

Over the next few years, I added to my collection by purchasing lots of commemorative stamps. The United States government issues many stamps to honor special events and important citizens on a regular basis. Even specific stamps are printed including: Airmail stamps, Postage Due stamps, Revenue Stamps, and many Commemorative stamps. Some of these have sentimental value which makes their prices higher in the collectible market.

Two of the stamps that I distinctly remember were the President John F. Kennedy memorial stamp and another one showing Neil Armstrong's first steps on the surface of the moon. The Kennedy stamp showed his face on one half and the eternal flame at his gravesite on the other side. The Armstrong stamp was in full color and actually showed the landing craft with him coming down the steps and touching the moon's surface. Even if they had no value, they were special to me because I had witnessed both historical events on television.

Many collectors choose to organize their philatelic collections on the themes of the stamps, such as animals, flowers, sports, space, airplanes, famous people, or a variety of other interests. One specific example of a theme is called first day covers. These are envelopes with stamps attached and are cancelled on the first day that the stamp was issued. Many of these have very high prices because of their unique design and historical significance.

The most important publication used by collectors is called the United States Postage Stamp Catalogue, published by the Scott Publishing Company. Without a catalogue, it is impossible to determine the value of an individual collection.

If you are interested in beginning a stamp collection, it is important to have lots of information to assist you, which can be located on the internet. Just type in stamp collecting and read what you find. Not

I 'm reasonably sure they never ate a lunch they brought from home. They routinely swapped out cold cuts for real home cooking.

Bible Talk

Our study this month will be on moral issues that face our society and our world.

Abortion- One plague in our society is the problem of voluntary abortion. Almost all of the abortions today are done as a matter of convenience. People want to refer to abortion being performed to save a mother's life, but only a handful of the babies slaughtered each year would fit into this category. Notice in Luke 1:41, "And it came to pass, when Elisabeth heard the salutation of Mary, the babe leaped in her womb; and Elisabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit;" Elizabeth was 6 months pregnant. The same word is used in Luke 2:12 about the "babe" wrapped in swaddling clothes. Most folks know that killing a newborn baby is wrong, but so is killing an unborn baby.

Gambling- On the topic of gambling, when you boil it down, gambling is stealing by consent. Based on some element of chance, I will take your money if the number comes up, or you will take my money if you pick the correct number. God recognized four laws of increase: 1) Labor, Eph.4:28. 2) Trading, Jam.4:13. 3) Gifts, Acts 20:35. 4) Inheritance, Lk.12:13. Gambling does not fit into any of these categories. Your best "bet", is not to make a bet at all.

Immorality- Adultery and fornication, or what can be called extra marital sex and premarital sex, are common forms of immorality today in our world. God declares, "*Let marriage be had in honor among all, and let the bed be undefiled: for fornicators and adulterers God will judge.*" Heb.13:4. Homosexuality and lesbianism are also immoral forms of behavior. "*Or do you not know that the unrighteous will not inherit the kingdom of God? Do not be deceived: neither the sexually immoral, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor men who practice homosexuality,*" 1 Cor.6:9. May God help us to see the sinfulness of all such conduct.

Foul Language- Paul said in Eph.4:29, "Let no filthy talk come out of your mouths, but only what is good for building up as the need may be. This way you will give grace to those who hear you." The word filthy means, "rotten, i.e., worthless, putrefied, unfit for use." We have several four letter words that are not fit for use, they are rotten, and should not be a part of our speech. Also, biblical words like "damn" and "hell" that are used in a profane way to curse people ought not to be used in our speech. Our words can condemn us, Matt.12:37.

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



Rockets fall hard to Danville in opener, 40-0

Rockcastle County certainly didn't start their season off the way they would've liked to on Saturday night.

The Rockets fell 40-0 to the Danville Admirals at the 2010 Bob Allen Pigskin Classic in what head Coach Scott Parkey called an "embarrassing performance."

A combination of special teams' errors and poor pass defense put the Rockets behind early, and their offense never could generate the momentum to recover.

"Special teams were a nightmare from fumbling the opening kick-off to giving up long punt returns all night," said Rockcastle County head coach Scott Parkey.

Rockcastle County only managed 73 yards of total offense. They also only completed one pass for eight yards and only managed to get into Danville territory one time, after defensive back Eli Haddix recovered a second quarter fumble. However, the Rockets couldn't capitalize as the ensuing drive only lasted three downs to be followed by a punt.

Clark Rowe, who rushed for over 2,100 yards during 2009, had only 47 yards on 21 carries. His longest run on the evening went for 11 yards.

"Danville's team speed made it very difficult to accomplish some of the things we wanted to offensively. We had a hard time blocking their linebackers and our angles to cut their penetration off was bad from the opening snap," Parkey said.

Turnovers also plagued Parkey's squad from the opening kick-off, when Zach Reams fumbled the return on the Rockets own 15 yard line. That set up a Danville touchdown run that put them up 6-0.

The Rockets special teams made another critical error in the first quarter when they fumbled the snap at their own 31 yard line. Danville quarterback Devonta Alcorn hit Cameron Burgess the next play from scrimmage to put the Rockets behind 12-0 with 1:29 to play in the first quarter.

Alcorn hit Burgess again with a touchdown strike early in the second quarter to make it 20-0. Each of Alcorn's first four completions resulted in a Danville touchdown.

After going into halftime down three scores, Rockcastle quickly fell behind two more scores after Alcorn connected on his first two passes of the sec-

ond half. Those two passing touchdowns put the Admirals up 33-0 early in the third quarter.

The only other score occurred in the fourth quarter after Danville returned a punt 88 yards to the Rockets 4 yard line. The next play, the Rockets gave up a four yard touchdown that put the final score on the board at 40-0.


In addition to Rowe's rushing statistics, senior John L. Saylor and junior B.B. Bradley each carried the ball four times for three yards. Junior tailback Chris Luna ran it 10 times and only managed 13 yards.

Through the air, junior quarterback Jadon Brock connected on one of five passes for eight yards. Junior receiver Nick Thomason was on the receiving end of the one eight yard connection.


On the defensive side of the ball, the Rockets only gave up 155 yards. However, they played on a short field most of the night as a result of the aforementioned Rocket turnovers.

Saylor led the way in the individual defensive statistic category with six tackles. Senior cornerback Corey Baker had five tackles and B.B. Bradley managed four tackles. Junior Ben Lake had four tackles and a sack and junior Nick Thomason had three tackles and two sacks.







•1 to 3 years- 10 to 13 hours

•3 to 10 years- 10 to 12 hours

•11 to 12 years- about 10 hours

•Teenagers- about nine hours

Keep in mind that these numbers reflect total sleep hours in a 24-hour period. For example, 12-year-olds who get up at 7 a.m. should be in bed by at least 9 p.m. to get their full 10 hours of sleep.

Children who are regularly sleep deprived are often exhibit behavioral problems. They may be irritable, overly emotional, have difficulty concentrating, forget easily, wake up several times during the night and may exhibit hyperactive behaviors.

Be firm about a bedtime routine. A routine could include giving your children choices about which pajamas to wear, the stuffed animal he or she wants to take to bed, etc. Try a warm, relaxing bath. Playing soft and soothing music can help. Tucking vour children into bed snugly can give them a feeling of security. Follow through with your plan consistently each evening, even if your children protest and test you at first. If you are firm, they will come to respect your guidance.

Just remember that every child is different, and there's not just one way to raise a good sleeper. As active as children are, most have the ability to sleep well. The key is for parents to help them establish healthy sleep habits and have a routine of winding down before heading for bed.




